

DEMPSEY WOULD FIGHT FOR SHARKEY'S NEW BELT

FORMER CHAMP STATES BOSTON GOB EASY MEAT

San Francisco, July 8 (AP)—Jack Dempsey would like to fight Jack Sharkey for the heavyweight championship of the world.

"If there's one man I can beat it's Jack Sharkey," the former champion declared here last night in a radio interview. "I'd like to fight him for the championship of the world."

Dempsey recalled knocking Sharkey out in the seventh round of a fight in 1927, and said he believed the same tactics he used then to defeat the Boston gob would be successful again.

"I have looked at the Sharkey-Schmeling pictures and think Sharkey has showed up considerably since I fought him," said Dempsey. "Furthermore, he's the type of fighter I think I can beat. He comes in on you, and is particularly susceptible to a body attack."

Dempsey said he would like to have a 15-round bout with Sharkey to give him time to wear the champion out. He added, however, the time is not now ripe for such a fight, with boxing at a low ebb throughout the country.

The former champion, who is appearing at a theater here, said that in view of the protests over the Sharkey-Schmeling decision, Sharkey should offer the German a return bout immediately.

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Rider Earl Sande Worried With Hard Diet, To Invade France

New York, July 8 (AP)—Earl Sande, who rode to fame on some of America's greatest thoroughbreds, is packing his kit for an invasion of the French turf. Finding it difficult to make the weight necessary to keep busy on American tracks, the popular little rider intends to sail for France within a fortnight. "Just as soon as I can arrange my affairs here I'll be on my way," Sande said.

How long he will remain abroad depends on his ability to obtain mounts and win with them. If successful, Sande probably will spend the remainder of his riding days showing the French how he became America's premier jockey.

Sande returned to the turf this spring after a year in the movies and radio but he has found it difficult to keep his weight down. He has frequently made 115 pounds but this has entailed much hard exercise and dieting. He figures he can easily make 118 pounds and that weight should get him plenty of mounts in France where there are more weight for age and scale weight events.

Chicago, July 8 (AP)—Violet Popovich Valli, divorcee and former chorus girl who shot Billy Jurgis out of the Chicago Cub lineup Wednesday, today faced arraignment on a charge of assault with intent to commit murder.

The girl, who shot the Cub shortstop twice and attempted to take her own life, was transferred from the Illinois Masonic hospital to the Bridewell hospital, was to be arraigned if in condition to leave her bed.

Jurgis refused to sign a complaint against the attractive young brunette, but Policeman Michael Fay, the first officer to reach the scene of the shooting, made the charge. Jurgis said he "would rather not talk about it," and was worried only "over how soon I can get back into the lineup."

The girl said it was "up to Bill" if he wished to marry her.

"Bill" she said, "is the boy in 100,000 for me. I met him at a party a year ago, and if it wasn't love at first sight it was just about second."

Interviewed as the big liner slowly left her way up the bay through a light fog, Paavo said if his suspension was lifted by the international athletic federation and he won the long grind at Los Angeles he planned never to race again.

He declined to discuss his suspension by the I. A. A., which investigated charges of excessive expense accounts and failure to appear at scheduled meets, and answered most of the questions put through an interpreter with a shake of the head or a nod.

STELLA WALSH TO RUN FOR POLAND

Cleveland, July 8 (AP)—Stella Walsh, fastest of feminine track stars, today declined to accept naturalization as a citizen of the United States and may run under the colors of her native Poland in the coming Olympic games.

If she clings to her decision, the United States has lost virtually certain points in the women's dashes.

Miss Walsh announced her plans when she appeared in federal court this morning for a special hearing at which she was to have been granted her citizenship papers.

She exhibited a cablegram from Poland, written in Polish, which she refused to translate, but she said it contained information which "might affect my entire future life."

Her trainer and advisor, Dan Griffin, who was to have been her witness at the hearing, tried to persuade her to change her mind, but she said it was a matter for only herself to decide.

During the last three years, she has set 10 world's spring records for women.

The Seals are a little more than one game ahead today, but the lead is precarious, for the Angels beat San Francisco yesterday 5 to 3.

Taking advantage of Pitcher Jimmie Zinn's weakness in the fourth inning, Los Angeles tallied all its five runs. They made two singles, and were helped along by three walks, issued by Zinn, as well as some loose fielding. Zinn pitched good ball except for that one bad frame, allowing only three other safe blows. Ed Baecht, on the mound for the Angels, was reached for two runs in the fifth inning. He allowed the Seals only seven hits.

A home run by Demaree was all Sacramento could do toward showing the home fans any scoring, and Portland won its third straight game of the series, 4 to 1. Berger started the scoring in the first inning with a home run.

The Hollywood Stars had a big fifth inning last night, making seven runs during a nine-hit barrage, and beat the Missions 10 to 3. The Stars collected 17 hits from four Mission pitchers. Vance Page held the Reds to seven hits.

SOLONS DROPPED TO 5TH PLACE

New York, (AP)—The Detroit Tigers pounced on the Yanks yesterday to win in the 10th inning, 8 to 5, the first western team to defeat the Yanks on home grounds this season.

Cleveland replaced Washington in fourth position by beating the Senators twice, 3 to 2, and 4 to 3. Connie Mack's Athletics and the White Sox split a double-header, the Sox taking the first, 13 to 3, and dropping the second, 9 to 3.

In the national league, the Giants halted the leading Pirates' winning streak at six straight by defeating them, 4 to 3. This cut the Pirates' lead to two and one-half games, as the second-place Chicago Cubs blanked the Phillies, 7 to 0.

Home runs by Hargrave in the second inning and Shires in the eighth enabled the Boston Braves to nose out the St. Louis Cardinals, 5 to 4.

Brooklyn at Cincinnati was rained out.
