

HOPE HELD FOR RECOVERY OF HUGGINS LAD

Memphis, Tenn., July 13 (AP)—A trio of women hovered over the cot of wan-faced, little Joe Huggins, nine. Confident that some day he would rouse from the sleep which today had held him for the 20th day.

"Joe is getting along nicely," cheerfully declares Mrs. S. T. Rider, who has cared for the little sleeping sickness victim in her home since he left a hospital May 2.

One by one the days have passed by until it lacks but two days of being nine months since little Joe drowned off into his long nap.

But today the three women who have watched over the sleeping boy are sure they see signs of recovery despite the fact that some medical men had almost despaired of awakening him. Tenderly watching with Mrs. Rider, who gave Joe a home after reading about him, are the boy's 19 year old, red haired aunt, Birdie Suetdewell, and his grandmother, both from Abbeville, Miss.

"Of course, he is still—well, not unconscious, but semi-conscious," Mrs. Rider said of the slim little fellow who has lain on his cot now for months.

"And he has to be fed. He just lies there—out in the sun, or in the cool of the house—all day. He never talks. He hasn't taken food through a tube for two months now, and I feed him with a spoon. It's slow. But I still believe that some day he will get well."

The experiment of Dr. Eugene Traut, of Oak Park, Ill., in taking a serum from the blood of Patricia Maguire, 27, who has been in a coma for 147 days, using it in an attempt to cure her, interests Mrs. Rider.

"We've had so many offers to furnish serum and other applications that I am leaving everything to our doctor as to whether he will try to get some of this new serum for Joe," Mrs. Rider said.

Dr. C. J. Keeton, chiropractor who has been treating Joe in recent months, said he would watch with interest reports on the progress of the use of Dr. Traut's serum, and "be sure to use anything that proves satisfactory."

Coe's Cove On Lake to Be Outing Camp For Chemeketan Group

Coe's cove, at the extreme north end of Spirit lake on the north side of Mt. St. Helens will be the site for the annual outing of the Chemeketas, local hiking organization. While the Chemeketas have been conducting outings for a number of years the trip to Spirit lake will mark the second venture out of the state.

The two weeks between August 7 and 21 have been selected for the event this year.

The camp this year will be easily reached, with the first 122 miles of the trip to Castle Rock, being over the paved Pacific highway. From Castle Rock for a distance of 36 miles the highway is gravel surfaced with the additional 12 miles

over an ordinary mountain road which is not steep or dangerous. Automobiles will be left at the ranger station on the south side of the lake while a launch trip of three miles will complete the journey to the cove.

Spirit lake is a body of crystal clear water covering an area of several square miles and bordered on all sides by dense forests. Its elevation is around 3200 feet.

While there are many trails to explore and lesser peaks to climb, the major event of the outing will be the scaling of Mt. St. Helens Sunday, August 14.

The campsite of the Chemeketan outing is on property belonging to the estate of the late Dr. Coe, although within the boundaries of the Columbia national forest. A large stream of pure mountain water pours into the lake near the camp.

A boat landing is available while opportunity for fishing, boating and swimming is excellent. The claim is set forth that there are no mosquitoes.

Owing to the general reduction in the cost of living the charge for the outing has been lowered. The committee in charge is quoting a rate of \$24 per person for two weeks with an average attendance of between 10 and 14. If 20 or more spend two weeks at the camp the charge will be \$20 or \$12 for one week. Non-Chemeketas are charged an additional \$1 per week. The rates include transportation both ways for each person and damage not to exceed 35 pounds.

Reduction is made where the camper provides his own automobile. Registration for the outing will be made at the Senator hotel. J. Burton Crary, who has provided the meals for Chemeketas outings ever since their inception has again been secured as chef. He is also general chairman of the Chemeketan annual outing committee and further information regarding the expedition can be secured from his or from President T. M. Hoffnall, Dr. C. A. Downs, C. W. Noble, W. H. Hamilton and Richard Upjohn, members of the committee.

Joker In New Statute Protects Relatives On Government Payroll

Washington, July 13 (UP)—A joker has been discovered which serves to protect congressmen's wives, daughters, sons and other relatives from the full forces of the new economy and pay reduction law.

The entire house membership is revising its payroll in accordance with the new economy act, but congressmen fixed the law so they could deal gently with relatives.

One middlewestern congressman has even increased his wife's salary. An eastern congressman has taken off one relative and substituted another at higher pay.

Comparatively few wives and other relatives are being dropped, though the law frowns on double family employment in other departments. Full details of these changes will be reported later.

Despite the storm aroused by recent United Press publication of details concerning the way the family payroll racket operates in congress, more of 100 or more members, including in these practices are sitting tight. They are waiting for the excitement to blow over.

Despite the opening of the payroll records to inspection by house resolution, despite the defeat of Senator Smith W. Brookhart, R. Iowa, partly because five other Brookharts were on the federal payroll, and despite floods of indignant letters from poverty stricken constituents, the majority of congressmen are taking a courageous stand on this issue. They are standing loyally by their right to hire relatives. They took a cut of 10 per cent themselves.

In these hard times campaign contributions come "slowly." The thrifty members are trying to make their clerk hire allowances, mileage allowance for stationary and other petty side revenues of a seat in the house of representatives carry this year's election expenses. Many a wife and daughter will have to surrender government pin money to help pay for dad's campaign this year.

For a time they had a close call when the economy bill was considered. But members framed the law so that their clerks come under a special category. Each congressman had been allowed \$5,000 for clerk hire. The new law cuts this 81-3 per cent, down to \$4,583.33.

AUBURN PRISON MORALE RISES UNDER BROPHY

Auburn, N. Y. (UP)—A remarkable atmosphere of contentment hovers over Auburn prison—quite the contrary to three years ago when two bloody riots broke out.

Peace and quiet prevails where once a deadly tension gripped the old state prison. The inmates have changed from glowering, desperate convicts to placid, obedient ones.

Additional freedom, better food and more recreation facilities, inaugurated by Warden Joseph H. Brophy when he assumed office last year, have brought about the improved condition.

In fact, the prisoners themselves are so pleased with Brophy's administration that on his first anniversary as head of the institution they presented him with a handsome hand drawn testimonial on parchment paper, framed in inlaid walnut wood.

The testimonial, signed "The Boys in Gray," thanked Warden Brophy, Principal Keeper Vernon A. Morhouse and the Rev. William F. Bergan, Catholic chaplain, for their cooperation in making prison life more bearable.

They cited "the better grade of talking pictures, the new baseball equipment, the golf course (miniature), the numerous prizes awarded to further competition in the various athletic events, and last but not least the shower baths in the yard which to most of us are of inestimable value," among the new means of recreation afforded by the officials.

"You three gentlemen," the testimonial—exceptionally well written—said, "have done much toward making our lot a better one, and by way of reciprocation, we shall endeavor to prove that we are deserving of your kind consideration by deporting ourselves like the men you expect us to be."
