## Portland Tea Interests Local Folk

The Salem branch of the American Association of University Women, and other local women's organizations, have received invitations to the silver tea to be given Friday afternoon between 3 and 4 o'clock at the home of Mrs. Arthur Long, 964 Woodstock avenue, Portland, for the benefit of the International House on the University of Oregon campus at Eugene. Mrs. Hannah Martin, president of the Salem Woman's club and recently elected to the state legislature, is one of the patronesses for the tea. The tea is under the auspices of seven major women's organizations in Portland including the Portland Federation of Women's Organizations, the Portland branch of the American Association of University Women, the women's organization of the Portland Council of Churches, the Portland League of Women Voters, the University of Oregon Mothers, the Catholic Women's League and the Council of Jewish Women.

The tea will follow the day's session of the Pacific conference on international relations, to be held this week at Reed college. Mrs. Long's home is quite close to the college campus.

During the tea hour a musical program, arranged by Mrs. Jacob Kandler, will be presented, which, it is hoped, will include selections by Dr. T. Z. Koo on the Chinese flute. Dr. Koo has come from China to attend the conference.

The International House at Eugene, patterned after similar houses established by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., at Columbia university and the universities of Chicago and California, was founded three years ago through the efforts of Mrs. W. G. Harold S. Tuttle and the Eugene Rotary club to afford foreign students attending the university, as well as American students who were internationally-minded, an opportunity for group life and contacts. Students are elected to residence in the house on much the same basis as are fraternity members, and the number housed during the three-year period just closed has averaged between 16 and 25. Eleven nationalities have been included. Friday's benefit is intended to wipe out past indebtedness against the house.

## Honor Newly Elected Officers

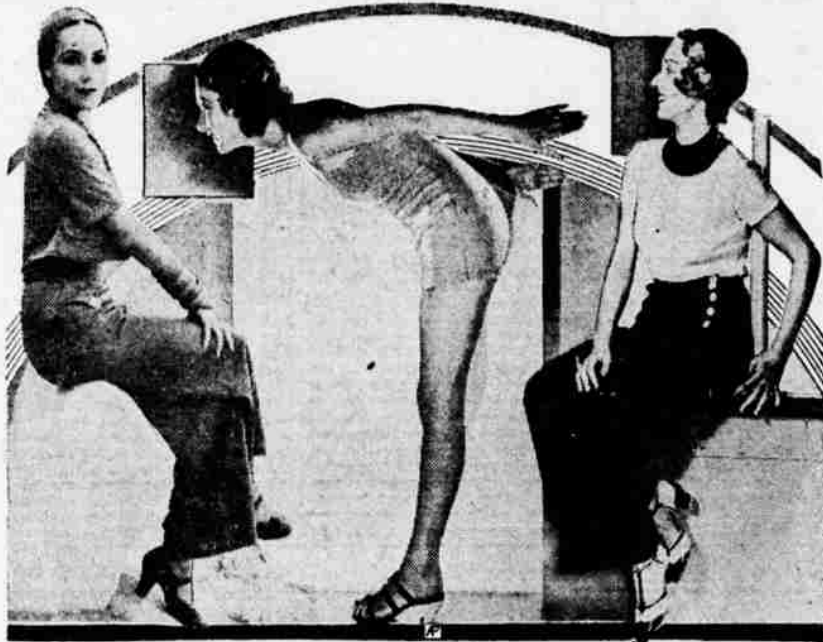
