

INDEPENDENCE STORE THEFTS ARE PUNISHED

Independence—The state police, assisted by the local officers were successful this week in running down clues which led to the apprehension of the two young men, Roy Reynolds of Salem and Lyle Pagenkoff of this city, for attempted burglary on the J. C. Penney company store Saturday night before the Fourth. These young men after several questioning admitted the crimes and were sentenced immediately by Judge Walker to three and two years in the penitentiary. They were taken to Dallas Saturday afternoon by Sheriff Hocker and Pagenkoff is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Pagenkoff of this city and Reynolds has been employed at a service station in Salem.

Plans were laid to enter the store at midnight July 2. The young men went to the gravel bunkers to await the time for action and fell asleep, one of them said, and it was not until 3 o'clock before they were into action. They took a ladder from the bunkers to make the climb to the roof of the building and made an opening in the skylight by taking out a section of the sheet-iron used as a ventilator.

They saw the night marshall go off duty at 3 o'clock and worked until sunup before they gained an entrance and then it was too light to carry out their intentions. People in the vicinity were getting up and several cars passed the scene of action which drove them to cover and soon abandoned the job. In all probability they expected to return and complete the job the next night, as the store would be closed over the Fourth. The manager of the store happened to go to the store Sunday morning and found the broken glass and gave the officers the information.

The boys were questioned separately regarding the attempted break and made conflicting statements which led to their apprehension. The officers surrounded the home of one of the men about midnight Monday and while one officer was questioning the parents relative to the whereabouts of the son, he went out a back door and into the arms of other officers stationed there. The parents maintained that the son was not at home and had not come in for the night. Just at that moment he was handcuffed and taken away from their presence by the officers and lodged in the Dallas jail until a hearing was arranged. The names of two other young men have been mentioned in regard to the burglary but they have been cleared by the confession.
