## Oil Drillers On Steiwer Farm To Open Operations

Jefferson.—It is stated that Thomas Hawkins of Corvallis, driller and Chas. S. Henry, geologist, will drill a gas and oil well on the Karl Steiwer farm about seven miles north of here. They have leases on 2550 acres of land for gas and oil drilling, extending on either side of the highway for a mile north and south from the Steiwer farm to the Simpson place and about three miles east and west.

Tools will be brought from Corvallis. They expect to reach gas at 1500 feet. The point at which the test will be drilled is 200 feet west of the highway at the top of the dome on the prairie orchard through which the highway forms a curve.

## JOHNSON HAS DALLAS TRIAL

Dallas.—The trial of L. L. Johnson, charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, began Friday morning in circuit court here. Johnson, whose residence is given as Portland, is a married man and was on the judge's list for the Molalla Buckaroo.

The defendant is alleged to have taken Margaret Lane, who will be 16 on July 23, with him to his home in Portland. Witnesses placed on the stand Friday morning included James Lane and his wife, the girl's father and mother, Mrs. Elona Brown of Salt Creek, a neighbor of Lane's and the girl herself.

Evidence presented showed that Johnson had stayed with the Lane family on the night of June 19 and that he had discussed business matters with the father relating him to work at Molalla during the round-up. Shortly after his departure the girl, Margaret, was missed. The parents went to Molalla seeking her and found the overalls which she had been wearing at home hanging on a wagon there. The girl was picked up in Portland by the authorities while Johnson was arrested and returned to Polk county for trial where he waived all preliminaries in order to ensure a speedy trial Elmer Barnhart, district attorney, is conducting the prosecution while the defense attorney is Edwin Keen.

## WILLIAMSON HAS 80TH BIRTHDAY

Hazel Green.—Relatives and friends gathered at the Peter Williamson home recently to help celebrate his 80th birthday. Mr. Williamson has lived in Hazel Green 48 years.

Williamson was born in Denmark coming to America at the age of 23. After a short time in Michigan he came to Oregon and settled in the Waldo Hills near Stayton where he bought his present home farm of John Gilbert, father of Ralph Gilbert. Thirty-five of his 240 acre farm was cleared. In the early days it was the custom to kill turkeys by girdling and let them stand. One field had many dead stumps 150 to 200 feet tall to be plowed around. Williamson raised many large crops of potatoes, the new lands producing 200 and 300 bushels to the acre. The heavy timber was cut and sold as cordwood to the state hospital and Chenawah Indian school.

During the hard times in the 90's many men were employed in cutting and hauling the wood. The stump farm as it was called then has become one of the finest farms in the Willamette valley. The draining of Lake Lahli gave a tract of 1000 usable beaver dam land on the east side of the farm and is now leased to onion growers while the remainder of the farm is in strawberries.

In 1894 Williamson was married to Anna Jackson of Stayton. After her death in 1896 he married Matilda Peterson of Sublimity, who passed away three years ago. Since then his youngest daughter Carolyn has presided over the family home. A modern home of English design has replaced the rambling farm home which burned early this spring.

L. Turner to erect another grist mill. This led to the founding of Scio in Linn county.
