GENEVA LIMITS LAND GUNS OF

Geneva, July 20 (P)—The general commission of the world disarmament conference today received from a sub-committee the draft of a declaration to be adopted before adjournment.

At the last minute there was written in a clause providing that all heavy land guns of calibres between certain limits shall be limited in number.

As drawn by Sir John Simon and Premier Benes of Cacchoslovakia, and approved by the delegations of the four powers, the declaration has five divisions:

The first asserts that the conference decides, "guided by the general principles underlying President Hoover's disarmament declaration (a) that a substantial reduction in world armaments shall be affected, to be applied by a general convention alike to land and naval armaments, and (b) that the primary objective shall be to reduce means of attack."

Division two lists the points on which the conference, in concluding its first phase, notes an agreement. These are prohibition of air attacks against civillan populations; shoulton of all aerial bombardment, subject to certain reservations, which include regulation of civil aircraft with full publicity limitation of maximum tomnage of tanks and prohibition of chemical, bacteriological and incendiary warfare.
