

WOODBURN IS TOO EAGER TO ATTEND FIRES

Woodburn—A brief meeting of the Woodburn city council was held Tuesday night and the main topic of discussion was the fact that the people of Woodburn in their eagerness to attend fires greatly hamper the work of the firemen by parking cars too near the burning building.

It was suggested that the chief of police be instructed to be present at all fires to direct traffic and that the day marshal come on duty at such times to take the place of the night men when fires occur at night. Mayor Broyles stated that in the future this plan would be followed and if necessary arrests would be made to keep the space clear of cars within a block of fires.

An ordinance was passed establishing grades on Bryan street and a report was made that the new fill made by W. J. Uppendahl was satisfactory.

A request from the bureau of labor for an extensive report on the water system was not granted owing to the expense entailed. A report was made of some changes in the machinery at the water plant which are expected to effect a saving of 10 per cent in power.

4:15 to 5:00 all swimmers over 17 and senior life saving.

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Gen. Sheridan Souvenir Expedition Is Successful; Mrs. Austin Finds Relics

Woodburn—A list of the articles used in furnishing a room in the Memorial Cabin at Champope by Chemeketa Chapter has been submitted by Mrs. Grace J. Austin, (Mrs. A. E.) together with the names of the donors.

The list includes: A piece of the canvas cover on one of the Sanford Watson wagons, 1849, and a housewife which was the property of Maria Elder Watson, given by Miss Lillian Applegate; four-poster bed of William Elliot, given by B. F. Shrock; trundle bed and cradle of Dr. Martin Gelsy of the Aurora Colony, given by Mrs. Eugene Mosher; flax spinning wheel, given by Ida Bronkney Noyes; trunk, 1849, Adam Stephens family; shoes, square toed, Gabriella Stephens; hinges, made when my Smith by Sanford Stephens; telephone, home made, early wood cards, leather back chair, candlesticks, quilt, homespun, 1849, Adam Stephens, all given by Mrs. Madison Halbert; quilt, blazing star, made and given by Miss Dora Walker; pillow, English chintz, 1825, given by Mrs. Clara Hicks Jones; chair, used by Mrs. James Jory, 1847, given by Mrs. Edward Jory; looking glass, used before the Civil war by Lieutenant Phil Sheridan; table, used as a writing desk by Phil Sheridan, (the pigeon hole in this desk is lost).

Mrs. Austin has written a very interesting story concerning the souvenirs of General Sheridan which follows:

"I was reminded quite recently that over on the Grande Ronde Indian Reservation relics of Lieutenant Phil H. Sheridan can be found. The story told by a teacher from the reservation was so interesting that I planned to visit it at once and see for myself.

"At once," was the next day when I drove over part of the route between Fort Vancouver and Fort Yamhill that was so familiar to Sheridan and his associates during the six years he was on the coast. The isolated post at Fort Yamhill was abandoned when he was called east by the Civil war, but it had done its part toward making Oregon territory a state. Valley Junction, where I stayed that night, is located at the foot of Fort Hill, as the one time site of the block house now in Dayton is called. It marks the union of the Salmon River cut-off to the ocean and the route through Old Grande Ronde.

"That evening I climbed with others to the top of Fort Hill. We followed the path, along which Sheridan passed back and forth from the block house to the house where he lived on the western slope of the hill, and clambered over an ancient snake fence as well as wire ones that certainly were not there in his time. Near the top of the all but inaccessible eastern side the clearly outlined trenches before the vacant site can be seen from the highway that circles the hill. In spite of the creepy feeling of unseen warriors behind us, we stood on the highest point and gave ourselves over to the enjoyment of the glided scene spread all about us.

"Back of Fort Hill looms mysterious Spirit Mountain, on whose serrated, fireclad peak medicine men held awful council in the days of the red man's glory, while for on its way to the ocean Lookout Mountain stand watch on land and sea. Wisely taking the line of least resistance the Yamhill river, in its way to join the Willamette's peaceful journey to "Where Rolls the Oregon," and the shimmering road up which I had driven into the west, meander down the valley side by side.

"Paralleling the new road the track of the white man's iron horse passes through the New Grande Ronde about two miles across the valley from "Older" to "Older" call it. At the foot of the long slope of the hill beside the road through Oldtown is the delightful woody park in which Yamhill Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, has marked on immense boulder in honor of the early Oregon lieutenant after whom the town of Sheridan is named.
