

VALLEY WATER PROJECTS ARE INTERESTING

Independence—At this dry season of the year, most farmers are interested in irrigation projects, and various methods are being demonstrated throughout the valley.

Valley Guild is planning for the installation of a small hydro-electric plant on its farm near Sheridan. He has a walnut and fruit farm in that vicinity which is in a productive state but he believes with the addition of this system he can materially increase his output. There are 112 acres in the farm, with 62 acres in 19-year-old walnut, and also some fruit trees on the place. Springs are available on the side hills from which he can secure a supply of water and with the unlimited power which he can generate there, can put water on every part of his land. He plans to assemble a plant which will generate from 10 to 15 horsepower, thus giving sufficient lighting also for the farm buildings.

Guild has been here this week conferring with his brother, Joe Guild, and others relative to the proposition. He has been spending his summers on the farm and living here in the winter. The plant development is the part of a project to make his orchard more attractive and a more desirable place to live. Additional buildings are included in his plan.

A further demonstration of the value of water to land, at this time of year, was made this week at the Dr. R. Lee Steiner ranch, north of the Horst company ranch, with County Agent Beck in charge of arrangements. This is the sprinkler system type and is largely a home-developed scheme of irrigation. Old boiler tubes, some inches in diameter, perforated, and placed on small wheels, are used. This can be easily moved from place to place, affording the same amount of water to low and high levels alike. The demonstration was quite a success and a number of farmers witnessed the event. The supply of slough and through the various laterals is carried to all parts of the 250-acre tract.

W. B. Milhollin, who recently traded for the small tract south of town, belonging to Bonin, has had a well drilled upon his place and will install an electric pumping device to be used in irrigating his land for vegetable gardening. Several larger systems of irrigation are in use on the larger hog ranches. E. C. Horst ranch and the C. A. McCaughin ranch, being among the largest, and Slopers Bros., south of town, have developed a home project for irrigation.

Hall Inventory Document Rare; Properties Vary

Wacoona—Charles M. Hall of Mission Bluff has just received a very interesting copy of the inventory of his grandfather, Charles M. Hall's, property, who owned a large plantation in Davidson county, Tennessee, and the record just received is more than 100 years old and is as follows:

An inventory of the property of Charles M. Hall, deceased December 22, 1825, Nancy B. BUTTER PLANT BUILDING HAS MT. ANGEL VOTE

Mt. Angel—By an overwhelming majority, 84 to 14, the stockholders of the Mt. Angel Cooperative Creamery voted upon to build a new butter manufacturing plant, Friday afternoon in the St. Mary's school auditorium. R. J. Berning, president of the creamery, presided at the meeting.

The whole cost, building and equipment will cost \$39,181. The building proper will cost \$19,161 complete. The new equipment is estimated at \$10,020 and the lots at \$1000. The contract for the construction of the building was let to Quigley Bros., of Portland, they being the lowest of six bidders. The bids were opened Tuesday evening in the city hall, in order that the stockholders would have a definite figure on what the building would cost before voting on it one way or the other. Quigley Bros. were the lowest bidders and the Austin company of Portland was the highest, \$14,483. Other bids were: Ryan-Schell of Portland, \$11,917; Barret of Portland, \$11,763; Stewart of Salem, \$12,338; and Hugh Range of Silverton, \$12,133.

The Quigley Bros. bid was originally \$10,854, but the stockholders decided upon some changes, which brought the cost to \$11,080. This bid does not include the painting, electrical wiring, plumbing and other items which will be either let to other concerns or done by the regular creamery crew.

The building will be 60x123 feet of concrete tile and steel construction. It will be located just south of the present creamery building, facing Garfield street, and will be of the very latest type of structure for efficient handling and manufacturing of butter. The maximum capacity will be 5,000 pounds of butter yearly, which will take care of expansion for some years to come, as it will be so constructed that this capacity could be doubled by the construction of an additional unit at a very nominal cost. The present building will be used for an office and for storage space.

The rapid growth of the local creamery has taxed the capacity for the present plant. Built for a maximum capacity of about 75,000 pounds of butter per month, the creamery turned out 211,620 pounds of butter in the month of May, which was the "peak" month. The creamery is also handicapped for lack of refrigeration space and space for additional vats.

Construction work will begin immediately. This is the second business building which is being constructed this month. The other building is the Oswald Red & White store which is being built on Main street and Charles streets, by Mills & Jarvis, Portland contractors.
