

# SIXTEEN POSTS EXPECTED AT LEGION GATHERING

## ALL DAY PICNIC AT HAZEL GREEN SET WEDNESDAY

Silverton—Sixty-two business firms have signified their intention as to their support of the efforts of Delbert Reeves post No. 7, American Legion, in the district picnic at Hazel Green park Wednesday, in agreeing to close their doors at 1 o'clock in the afternoon.

The affair will be open to the public and give in honor of the district, which includes the following posts: Robert Loop No. 45 of Amity, Carl B. Benton No. 43 of Dallas, Hillsboro No. 6 of Hillsboro, McMinville No. 21 of McMinville, Lester C. A large delegation of the state department and national commission will be on the grounds all day for the purpose of installing a pre-convention urn and to explain other things in regard to the national convention to be held in Portland September 12 to 15.

Other special guests will be Roy S. (Spec) Keene, of Salem, state chairman of Junior Legion baseball; Ed Boylis of Sheridan, district manager of Junior Legion baseball, and George R. Duncan of Stayton, district commander, who will present medals to the Woodburn players for winning the championship in the summer series. Fifteen individual players will receive the engraved medals during the ceremony just previous to the big free show in the evening. The Silverton school band under direction of Hal Campbell will furnish music during the presentation ceremony.

A dance with no-time hour limit will begin at 9 o'clock with Rollo Hendricks' seven-piece orchestra furnishing the music. No one need go hungry, as the committee on barbecue has hired C. F. Thomas, an expert barbecue man who heads the committee, to oversee the cooking of the beef. He is assisted by Lewis McEwen, Archie Thomas, T. P. Heidenstrom, "Red" Evans, Arthur Gottenberg and Arthur Dahl. The group will work all day Tuesday and Tuesday night to get the meat ready for the occasion, which is scheduled to begin at 11 o'clock Wednesday forenoon.

George Manolis as general chairman wants it distinctly understood that the affair is for the public, including all Legionnaires, and that the proceeds from the picnic will be utilized in showing the visiting delegates to the national convention the difference places in the Willamette valley, including resorts and cities. Signs have been placed directing those coming for the day's pleasures to follow the Pacific highway north from Salem to the Chemawa crossing, where other signs will guide them from the highway to the park. Archie Campbell has been active in placing the signs in order to avoid confusion in finding the way to the picnic grounds.

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## SKIN COATING WORK ORDERED BY COUNCILMEN

West Salem—The city council held a special meeting Saturday evening to consider the question of street improvements. All members but Dr. Goffrier who was out of the city were present, also a large number of tax payers.

Mayor Newcomb called for a discussion by the tax payers of the proposed street improvements.

Engineer Larsen gave an explanation of the skin surface work being done on the Wallace road and made it plain how the surfacing could be used to advantage on the city street.

The council adjourned for a taxpayers' meeting. The mayor called for nominations for chairman to preside. Earl Patton received the only nomination and was elected. He immediately took charge of the meeting. A motion prevailed that the city council be instructed to rescind its action to have the streets oiled and have a skin coating job done instead.

A motion carried that the council rescind its action of July 13 on oiling the streets and a motion prevailed that the street committee be empowered to have the skin coating done, working in harmony with the engineer and using his judgment as to where it was most necessary.

The work will be done as soon as the oil can get to it, and workers started preparations on Monday.
