Silverton—Mrs. Martin Knittel reported to Silverton police late Wednesday night that her husband had failed to return from a trip to the postoffice at about 3 o'clock in the afternoon. He was driving a model A Ford roadster, with a Wyoming license, and according to Mrs. Knittel, had several hundred dollars in money.

Mrs. Knittel explained that they had sold some property recently and had realized \$600 and expressed her belief that he had most of it with him. The family live near Silverton on the Pudding river. She told the officers that if her husband returned she would make no further report during Thursday, and as they heard nothing from her supposed he had come home.

Late in the afternoon she brought a letter to headquarters that she had received from him, leaving her more mystified than ever. The letter was curt, contained a \$10 bill, addressed her as "Dear Nell", and said that the money would probably keep her until he returns. It had a Silverton post mark. The state police are aiding in the disappearance of Knittel.

OLD BUILDING WILL BE HOME OF ODDFELLOWS

Woodburn—The Woodburn I. O. O. F. lodge, which recently lost its home by fire, has abandoned the right to rebuild at the location it occupied for 36 years and has purchased the Francis Feller building at the corner of Front and West Lincoln streets. The deal is not yet closed, pending the preparation of a satisfactory abstract.

The building in question has been used as a rooming house on the upper floor with a store room in front on the lower floor which is occupied by Mrs. Daisy Miller as a dress and hat shop. Back of this there are housekeeping rooms. If the deal is completed the upper floor will be converted into a lodge room 23 by 49 feet in size, with property rooms in the front part. The lower part will remain as at present and be rented. Work of remodeling the building will be done by members of the lodge and they expect to have it completed and ready for occupancy before the first of September.

Plans have not been completed for the rebuilding of the first floor of the burned building which was the property of Maurice and Vera Bogard but it has been stated that it will be rebuilt in the near future. Since the I. O. O. F. lodge has decided not to rebuild the upper floor of the new building will probably be one story only.
