DIFFERENTIAL ON GRAIN RATES BRINGS PROTEST

Seattle, July 29 (AP)—Indignant protests from Seattle representatives at the grain rate hearing of interstate commerce commission examiners today greeted a proposal that the two-cent differential which Portland now has on grain rates from some sections of Idaho be extended to include a greater area of that state.

The proposal was voiced by Bert L. Penn, rate expert of the Idaho public utilities commission. Samuel J. Wetrick, attorney for the Seattle chamber of commerce, was to formally attack it late today.

Seattle long has fought the two-cent freight rate differential rate of Portland in shipments from the Columbia basin south of the Snake river.

Penn made his suggestion in demanding the "lowest possible legal rate to the nearest port." The rate to Seattle and Portland from the Idaho areas to which he would extend the differential with lower rates, now are equal.

The areas and rates suggested are: From Almo, Whitman county, Wash., to Peck, Nez Perce county, Idaho, 19 cents to Portland, 21 cents to Seattle. From Culdesac, Nez Perce county, to Grangeville, Idaho county, 21 cents to Portland, 23 cents to Seattle. From Stiles, Idaho county, to Peck, Nez Perce county, 20 cents to Portland, 22 cents to Seattle.

MAIL DELIVERY TO BE SLASHED

While no curtailment of delivery service in the residential districts of the city is contemplated at this time, nevertheless it may become necessary to reduce such mail delivery to one trip a day in order to conform with the economy regulations of the federal postal department. Such was the opinion expressed Friday by Postmaster John Farrar in commenting upon the protest of labor groups in Portland against a reduction in service in Portland.

The regulations sent out from Washington, D. C. are to some extent confusing as to their real meaning. It is said, and until all points have been cleaned up, the local office will not know exactly what measures must be taken to effect economies. At the present time all clerks and carriers with the exception of supervisors and rural mail delivery men are being furloughed an average of a day and a half a week without pay. In every case where a city mail delivery man has been laid off, however, a substitute has been put in his place. This method saves the money which usually went for vacation relief work.

If it becomes necessary to make but one delivery a day in the residential districts, Postmaster Farrar believes the patrons of the service will cooperate. The afternoon delivery of mail is considerably lighter than the one occurring in the forenoon.

Roseburg Expansion Rejected by Voters

Roseburg, Ore., July 29 (AP)—Voters of Roseburg, yesterday at a special election rejected a proposal to consolidate those residential districts within the city limits of Roseburg. The proposed extension of the city limits of Roseburg, to include those abutting areas lying between the city proper and the site of the Northwest National Soldiers' home was defeated by a vote of 92 to 216. The Edenbower and Riverside districts rejected the proposition by only three votes, 65 to 68, but in West Roseburg the count was 27 for inclusion and 148 against. The city of Roseburg voted 517 to 14 to admit the abutting territory in the event of inclusion being desired.

Firemen Helpless As His Home Burns

Savannah, Ga., (AP)—J. W. Fogarty, a fireman, knew his home was burning, but could do nothing about it.

A call came in at headquarters and the address given was his own. Fogarty drives the assistant chief's car but on first call, the assistant chief spends only within a certain territory, within which Fogarty does not live.

While another company extinguished the blaze, Fogarty remained anxiously on duty.

OPENING WEDGE FOR CONFERENCE

Washington, July 29 (AP)—An opening wedge to a world economic conference along the lines proposed by Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, was given the United States today in a formal invitation received by the state department from the League of Nations to participate in a world financial parity.

This financial conference under league auspices was suggested by the recent Lausanne conference whose agreement virtually cancelled Germany reparations payments and a world parity considering war debts and monetary problems.

The state department took the league invitation under consideration without comment. However, Senator Borah has urged this government to take the initiative. He is of the opinion that success of a world conference would be promoted better if a government undertook the responsibility.

2 NAVAL FLIERS LOST IN CRASH OFF DEL MAR

San Diego, Cal., July 29 (AP)—Two naval fliers were believed lost today when the patrol plane 3-P-9, attached to patrol squadron 2-3, crashed 20 miles at sea off Del Mar.

Three other occupants of the plane were rescued. Dispatches from the destroyer Sandpiper, which was nearby, said "three others in the plane have not been recovered." It was thus not determined if they had been carried under the water by the plane or were still aloft and safe.

Those believed lost were Lieut. (JG) Dick Downer, pilot, and John S. Hogan, aviation pilot first class. The rescued were John C. McDonald, aviation machinists mate first class; Howard F. Mears, aviation pilot first class; Claude Manley, radio operator first class.

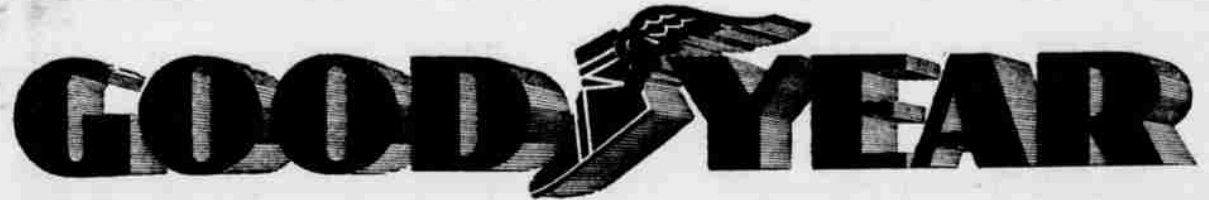
