BANK CLOSURE BIG SURPRISE

Willamina—The people of Willamina were surprised Thursday morning to find a notice posted on the door of the Willamina State bank stating that the institution was now in the hands of the state superintendent of banks. This action was taken voluntarily by the board of directors at a meeting held Wednesday evening after every effort to find a way of continuing the business had failed.

At a meeting of depositors held at the school house Thursday at 11 o'clock at which about 90 were present, the situation was thoroughly explained by Supt. Schram. He explained that the trouble was caused by the depression which has caused the decrease in valuation and marketability of all assets, and the continued withdrawal of deposits which depleted the cash reserve to the danger point. All possible means of meeting the situation were thoroughly discussed and found unavailable.

As a final resort and in order to protect the depositors the bank was turned over to the state banking department for liquidation.

Mr. Fundman, cashier, says that in his opinion depositors should eventually receive 100 cents on the dollar, but that it would require some time.

The book value of the assets is \$262,213.22, with liabilities at \$65,783.76. Mr. Schram also stated emphatically that there were no signs of dishonesty of any kind among the bank's officials.

HORSE IS BURNED; HUNT HOME RAZED

Fire of unknown origin destroyed a barn, horse, tools and hay crop on the Holzclaus place near Claxton station north of Salem while he was in Salem early Friday afternoon. No one was home at the time the fire was discovered but neighbors report having seen some children playing in the neighborhood of the barn shortly before the fire broke out.

Woodburn—Fire completely destroyed the house on the old Hunt farm about one mile south-west of Broadacres at 5:15 o'clock Friday afternoon. The farm is now owned by Miller brothers of Woodburn and the house was occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Percy M. Rather and six children, the oldest of whom is 15 years of age. Neighbors assisting in removing part of the household furniture and four small puppies. About 100 quarts of canned fruit were lost.

The chemical truck of Woodburn and the Hubbard fire apparatus were on hand but could do little except to protect other buildings on the place. The fire started on the roof, presumably from the chimney, which was reported to be in an unsafe condition. This is the second fire this family has suffered since last October, when their home on the Cruse place burned. There was no insurance, either on the building or its contents. Rather served overseas in the World war and is a member of the American Legion.

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Stage Operator Varied Offender

Woodburn—George Mercer, operator of a 25-passenger bus enroute from San Francisco to Seattle, was arrested Thursday night by a state traffic officer on charges of having improper license plates, no public service commission plates, no insurance and no seat tax receipt on his vehicle. The bus was equipped with only a dealer's license borrowed from the American LaFrance company of San Francisco and was occupied by four passengers. Mercer appeared before Judge Overton Friday and exhibited receipt showing he had purchased the necessary license at a cost of \$122 following his arrest. He was given a fine of \$10 and costs amounting in all to \$125 which he paid.

Landmark At Scio Offers Relic Study

Scio—Within a few miles of Scio is a building which was erected about 80 years ago and in which the material still in fair state of preservation, according to statements made to R. M. Cain, pioneer Scio merchant, who visited the place a few days ago.

The site of this historic structure is the old Smallman farm near the North Santiam river northwest of this city, now occupied by the Troilings.

For years the residence on the Smallman place was considered the finest in Linn county and was erected several years before Scio came into being. It was of the old colonial type, with two fire places. The cream of the valley in the matter of raw building materials was available at that time, and the lumber used in the structure indicates that it was the product of a crude sawmill.

It is believed that some of the paint now on the buildings was put on at the time of the completion of the house more than three quarters of a century ago. Settlers in this part of the valley were few and far between, and a tribe of Indians is said to have made its home on the donation land claim.

Willamette Falls, now known as Oregon City, was the nearest trading point, according to those who told the story, and supplies were year in during the dry season of the year. Cut nails and other old time materials were used in the Smallman house.

On the old John J. Crabtree farm a few miles south of Scio, a log building erected nearly 80 years ago, pioneers claim. The house in which Sam Gaines lives, a short distance from the Crabtree place, is said to have stood in its present location more than 70 years.
