

BEND ELKS INVAD SALEM FOR SUNDAY BALL GAME

SENATORS ADD MANNING, WOOD TO PLAYER LIST

The team in the State baseball league which has probably scored more runs during the season and yet lost more games by close scores will be seen in action here Sunday afternoon when the Bend Elks invade Olinger field for a brush with the Salem Senators. The contest marks the second meeting of these two teams during the season, the Senators taking the first one at Bend by a 1 to 0 score. And while Bend has won but one game out of seven played, winning last Sunday's engagement with the Pacific Outfitters 20 to 11, the local crew is anticipating one of the hardest battles of the season.

After having been defeated by clubs in the circuit, the Bend management woke up to the fact that something was wrong since individually the Elks play about as good ball as any group of semi-pros in the state. So last Sunday Manager Wood did a little shifting about, placing the veteran catcher, Eubanks at second base and sent a youngster named Don O'Leary behind the bat. Both players fielded their new positions well, Eubanks handling eight chances without a bobbie.

The Senators will have two more men in uniform Sunday. Kenneth Manning who has been playing first base for the Woodburn team of the Cascade league, and Carl Wood, a cousin of Elmer "Dobe", of Amity, an infielder and a real hitter have been signed. Both men are first class performers and should strengthen the club during the closing games of the season.

The Senators cannot afford to drop any more games if they hope to finish near the top. With but three contests remaining in the regular season and with West Side and Eugene a full game ahead, the loss of one would probably prove fatal.

Wunder or Russell is expected to start on the mound for Bend with Wilson doing the chucking for the locals.

OPPOSE CHANGE IN GRID RULES

Pasadena, Calif., July 30 (AP)—After speeches by prominent coaches, the American Football Coaches' association, in annual meeting here, was on record today against further changes in gridiron rules.

The practice of the rules committee in making drastic changes each year was condemned, and it was suggested that the rules heretofore be altered only for the protection of players.

Andy Kerr, Colgate coach, suggested a radical change, urging that teams consist of 12 men instead of 11, the extra man to serve in a capacity similar to that of co-swain in a rowing crew and not take part in the play except as a field general.

Stade Roland Garros, Paris, July 30 (AP)—The United States today won the doubles match from France in their Davis Cup final to make the match score two to one in France's favor and leave the American youngsters a fighting chance for victory.

The scores were 6-3, 11-13, 7-5, 4-6, 6-4.

John Van Ryn and Wilmer Allison, the American team, rallied from almost certain defeat in the final set to overpower Henri Cochet and Jacques Brugnon, the French veterans, with a blistering net attack.

A victory for France would have ended the series. Now the Americans have a fighting chance but must sweep both singles tomorrow, Allison against Jean Borotra and Ellsworth Vines Jr., against Cochet.

CULTURE CLUE BEING SOUGHT

Belgrade (AP)—An American archaeological expedition backed by the Peabody museum, the School for Prehistoric Research, the Fog museum and Harvard university, has arrived here to take up excavation work begun last year, seeking evidence that Europe's prehistoric culture originated in what is now Yugoslavia.

The purposes of the expedition were explained by Vladimir Fuchs, Peabody museum director. The expedition's work last year included an inspection of the prehistoric finds at Starcevo, near Pancevo, in the neighborhood of Belgrade.

"The party previously had worked in Czechoslovakia," Fuchs said, "and established the fact that the prehistoric culture there was very closely linked with that of the Danube valley. Numerous finds made there doubtless originated in southern Yugoslavia. We came to the conclusion, therefore, that the prehistoric culture of Europe must be studied in Yugoslavia, where it apparently originated."

According to the dates so far known, the neolithic culture came from the Aegean sea and Asia Minor to Yugoslavia. We will first explore the prehistoric dwellings of South Serbia and then those of the Danube, Morava and Sava valleys, and the valleys of the Vardar tributaries through which the prehistoric culture found its way.

"Our work in Yugoslavia will be strictly scientific."

GRIDMEN FIGHT SURCHARGE

LEGALITY OF TAX ON GAMES WILL BE GIVEN TEST

Pasadena, Cal., July 30 (AP)—Prof. W. B. Owen of Stanford university and Major J. L. Griffin, commissioner of the "Big Ten," prepared today for a "showdown" with the federal government on the application of an amusement tax to football games and other collegiate sports enterprises.

They were under orders of the National Collegiate Athletic association to prepare a test suit to determine whether the government surcharge on admissions must be paid. The association was advised that the tax was unconstitutional as applied to educational and religious institutions.

The tax question featured the closing session of the association during which a number of suggestions were made, ranging from the addition of tax charges to tickets to having the colleges absorb the tax and thus lower admission prices.

The association decided to take its case to the United States supreme court if necessary.

Tenth Olympiad To Open

Los Angeles, July 30 (AP)—Nearly 2,000 athletes, dressed in the various colored costumes unique to their 39 nations, formed in line today to become the parade which will be the spectacular part of the Olympic games opening ceremony.

Brought here for the tenth modern renewal of the international contests which began with a simple footrace on the slopes of Mt. Olympus in Greece, in the days before Christ, these athletes of both sexes will stand at rigid attention while Vice President Curtis makes his speech of 14 words officially opening the games.

They will be seen by a capacity crowd of 105,000. The spectators will include part of the more than 200,000 persons attracted to Los Angeles for the newest version of the historic tests of athletic skill.

Within the next 16 days this group of the world's greatest stars of track and field as well as of rowing, equestrianism, boxing, wrestling, fencing, swimming and kindred sports, will have competed in a program of no fewer than 135 individual events.

Only one sport was represented in today's agenda. This was weight-lifting, preliminary tests of which will be conducted tonight in Olympic auditorium.

Thus the show centered today upon the spectacular parade of nations, on which the organization committee of Los Angeles has been laboring for more than four years. The program really starts at 2:20 (PST), when the international organization committee and the Los Angeles committee form at the Pershing entrance to receive Mr. Curtis.

Frazer of Molalla Wins Silver Medal

The team match was won by company B 186th Infantry. This was an 82nd Infantry brigade club. Their score was 1366 out of a possible 1500. The second place was won by Bend Rifle club with a score of 1341.

Finns Aroused Over Barring of Distance Runner

Helsingfors, Finland, July 30 (AP)—Action barring Paavo Nurmi from Olympic competition aroused national indignation in Finland to an unprecedented degree.

Demonstrations were arranged in many cities and villages. Telegrams were sent to the Finnish delegation at Los Angeles and to Olympic headquarters here urging the Finnish team to boycott the games.

It was understood, however, that authorities were firmly opposed to reprisals and had advised the team to participate in today's opening ceremonies.

GENERAL SHORT HAS LARGE POST

El Paso, Tex. (AP)—General Walter C. Short, commander at Fort Bliss, is the biggest boss in the southwest.

He controls the work of 4,000 men, his word is absolute law, his post represents an investment of man millions and annually spends \$3,000,000.

General Short commands the largest cavalry post in the United States. During war time he would command 28,000 men, and 45,000 auxiliary troops.

"I never wanted to be anything but a soldier," General Short said. "If I had to do it all over again I'd still be a soldier."

General Short is 62. He was born in Columbus, Ohio. He is known internationally as a horseman and rides daily on a superb mount presented him by Gen. Eulogio Ortiz of the Mexican army.

"I've never been anything but a cavalryman," he said. "I love horses."

He believes it is much easier to command soldiers than civilians. "We have less troubles because of our discipline, which takes no excuses for failure," he said. "Our organization is so rigid, so perfect that everybody knows what to do, and we require them to do it."

General Short is keenly interested in the future of the cavalry. "The cavalry is not passing out of the picture," he said. "On the contrary, every modern army in the world is keeping up its cavalry for the simple reason that troops with long range guns have to have ground reconnaissance. Only cavalry can give night ground reconnaissance. Airmen cannot see at night."
