

STATE CAMP MEETING ENDS AT WOODBURN SUNDAY

MANY OFFICERS CHURCH OF GOD ARE UNCHANGED

Woodburn—The state camp meeting of the Church of God which has been in session for 10 days at the camp ground north of Woodburn closed Sunday evening. While the attendance was somewhat lower than previous years owing to the depression a splendid meeting was held. There were about 100 tents on the grounds throughout the session and the attendance at the services on the two Sundays was close to 1000 people.

Officers were elected for the various departments, which include Rev. U. G. Clark of Portland who was elected chairman of the ministerial assembly for the second time and Walter Shrock, secretary who was also re-elected. F. E. Rawle was elected in place of George Gray on the year book and ordination committee. Other members of this committee are J. C. Chapman and C. K. Chapman. The 1933 camp meeting committee was elected. Green of North Bend was elected to succeed W. T. Seaton whose term had expired and E. H. Ahrendt of the second church of Portland was elected to fill the unexpired term of H. B. Wilson who has moved to Washington. The third member of this group is C. K. Chapman.

Next year the advertising will be in charge of a single advertising manager instead of the plan as used this year which left that duty to the chairman of the grounds committee and chairman of program committee which proved unsatisfactory.

The new plan of the ministerial benefit association which permits congregations and lay members to be contributors was endorsed. This organization includes 600 ministers and \$30,000 has been paid to ministers from this fund in the past three years.

The members of the Home Missions Board were chosen by the congregation and include C. E. Shumway, (re-elected), A. C. Johnson and J. J. Gillespie. The Oregon State business association which has control of the camp ground and other property is composed of R. J. Smith, D. O. Hayes, E. H. Rawle, J. J. Gillespie, D. W. Shrock, C. E. Shumway and Carl Jurett.

On the camp ground management committee D. W. Shrock was re-elected; other members are E. Watkins, J. L. Green, Sam Gibby and J. J. Gillespie.

Marshfield was chosen as the place of meeting for the young people convention which meets in the fall and Hans Nelson was chosen president of this department which also has charge of the young people's services on the camp ground.

Saturday a sermon on ordinances was preached at 10:30 and a baptismal service was held Saturday afternoon in Butte Creek when 14 people were baptized.

The usual services were held Sunday including Sunday school at 9 o'clock, a sermon on prohibition at 2:30 o'clock by C. K. Chapman, a musical program at 6:30 by the young people of the closing church of Portland and the closing service at 7:45 o'clock by U. G. Clark.

A new feature of this year which proved of great benefit was the installation of play ground apparatus for the children by Mr. Hunting of Portland.

"Grandma" Green, mother of the local pastor J. L. Green was given a place of honor during the meeting as the oldest member in attendance, she being 93 years of age. The next oldest was Jane Brown, who will soon be 90 years of age. The youngest member was a 7 months old baby.

Woodburn—The traffic over the Pacific highway should be much less this week if all cars bearing 1931 license plates are taken off the road. DAIRYMEN OF VALLEY BUILD

Jefferson—The large dairy barn which is being built on the Sam Quisen farm on the Looney Butte road five miles north of Jefferson, is nearing completion.

The building is 36x72 feet built on a 10 inch concrete foundation, supporting a 10 foot wall of 8 inch concrete blocks. The floor will be of cement and the barn will be divided by a partition—one side for dairy cows and the other section for farm stock complying with the rules for grade B milk. The hay mow holds 100 tons of hay and is already full of this year's crop. There are three hay chutes from the mow to the lower floor, two for the dairy herd section and one into the other division. Later Quisen plans to tear down the old barn adjoining and build an up-to-date milk house.

There is a fine field of yellow dent corn north of the barn which probably will be used in filling the two silos, each having a 55 ton silage capacity.

Quisen is one of the prosperous farmers in this community and is the only member of the Dairymen's association of Portland, Vancouver and Salem, south of Salem. He finds his membership in the association to be quite profitable, bringing him better prices for his products than he could otherwise command. His farm consists of 65 acres, with a new and modern house. His dairy herd comprises 20 head of fine Holsteins besides four or five young calves and about 17 heifers.

Dayton—A modern barn approximately 50x50 feet in size is nearing completion on the 80 acre farm of Frank Hulac in the Webfoot locality near here. Cement foundation is under the entire building and cement floor is in the portion used for 12 cows and other stock. First grade urtic is the exterior lumber which is being stained a cream colored paint. Lawrence Holdrede lives in the house on the farm but E. F. Schroeder has the far land leased. Hulac has stock on the pasture land. Hulac has five fine farms in the Willamette valley.

They are putting on a finishing top preparatory to putting a black top on this next year. Ten men started to work Monday traveling this road. They are under the supervision of Olaf Olsen.

The steam shovel was moved Friday into the upper Highland district onto market road No. 36 where a large cut will be made and 16,000 yards of dirt moved.

Cooley, state supervisor of vocational agriculture, and his son, Earl R. Jr.; Prof. H. H. Gibson, Oregon State College Agricultural Educational instructor; the teachers in the four schools, Ronald Burnett of Woodburn, Crabtree of Silverton, Ralph Morgan of Albany, and George Hoshorn of Lebanon; Smith-Hughes boys of Silverton, Herbert Jones, president of the local F. F. A.'s Ernest Erickson, Robert Hauge, Arnold Johnson, Roy Orren, Tom Miller, Harlan Lee, Sanford Davis, William Dunnigan, and Palmer Torvord; and two Woodburn boys, Frank Barrios and Arlie Skiller.
