Failure to hit at opportune times cost the Salem Senators a ball game Sunday afternoon and while the Bend Elks garnered but one more clout than did the home guard, the latter lost by the count of 7 to 3. The same impotent work with the bat which characterized the Senators' efforts a week ago hampered their tactics Sunday. Wunder, portside chucker for the central Oregonians yielded seven hits, among them a homer and triple by Oribble and a two sack smash by Walt Erickson. But with the exception of Erickson's hit, nobody was on the paths at the time. On the other hand Bend managed to bunch its hits in the third and seventh to make the most of them.

While the visitors committed enough errors to hand an ordinary ball game to the Senators on a pitcher, the Elks were fortunate Sunday since most of the bobbles came at times when little damage was done. The Senators gave Wilson and Wood bang up support and the pitchers had nobody to blame but themselves for the scores the Elks piled up. The men from the pine mill town collected three runs in the third on two hits and error and a hit batter. Another was added in the fourth on two hits and a sacrifice, while three more tallies were scored in the seventh on a triple, a double and a single.

The Senators had little chance to score during the first five innings, getting but two hits during that time. In the sixth the Senators scored but one run, although they filled the bases with but one way. Erickson and Scales singled, Manning flew out to center field, Gribble walked, while Erickson was thrown out at the plate on Foreman's infielder hopper. With bases filled Scales was walked in when Edwards was given a ticket to first. "Prisco" sent "Dobey" Wood in to pinch hit for Wilson but the latter only succeeded in forcing Edwards at second to retire the side.

In the seventh Ashby got a life when Board dropped his fly after making a long run to snare the ball. Erickson scored his fellow player a moment later with a two base hit.

The final score came in the eighth when Gribble socked one deep into right field.

The Senators threatened in the last inning after Kitchen had fanned. Ashby got a walk while Erickson and Scales hit singles in succession. However, Manning and Gribble flew out to left field to end the afternoon performance.

FRANCE TURNS BACK U. S. TEAM TO RETAIN CUP

Paris, Aug. 1 (AP)—Once again the United States has failed by the barest margin—three matches to two—to win the Davis cup from France, but her defeated young warriors carried bright hopes for the future as they started home today.

They were beaten when Jean Borotra came back from a tennis grave of his own choosing to play some of his most inspired tennis. But not until Ellsworth Vines, Jr., Uncle Sam's greatest hope, had met and subdued France's idol, Henri Cochet, and gave the defenders a taste of what is in store for them next year.

The three-day series concluded officially when Borotra, 34-year-old dervish, sent 12,000 admirers into near-hysterics by defeating Wilmer Allison, 1-6, 3-6, 6-4, 6-2, 7-5, in the first of yesterday's concluding singles.

Barley had the throng carried Borotra from the court, however, when its ardor was dampened by the sight of Cochet being defeated. It was his first beating in Davis Cup play in six years.

Vines, whipping himself to the heights, came back after dropping the first two sets to defeat the little tennis master, 4-6, 6-6, 7-5, 8-6, 6-2.

CROWNS HANDED 3 CHAMPIONS IN OLYMPIC GAMES

Los Angeles, Aug. 1 (AP)—After a glittering inaugural before the greatest crowd in Olympic history, then a record-smashing competitive overture, the Olympic track and field championships today featured the prospect that two of the most popular titleholders, Percy Williams of Canada, and Lord David Burghley of England, would be hard-pressed to keep up the pace and probably dethroned.

Bath barely survived the first day's battle for places, which gave 50,000 spectators in the Olympic stadium a succession of unexpected thrills, saw Olympic records shattered in four men's events and witnessed, all told, no less than eight record performances up to and including a world record javelin throw, for women, of 143 feet, 4 inches, by the "one-woman" track team from Dallas, Texas—Mildred (Babe) Didrikson.

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
