The ship is a six-seater cabin monoplane with a dining room, a kitchen and a shower. Another plane will refuel the ship and renew the food supply of the fliers as they shuttle back and forth between Portsmouth and London. Mrs. Bruce and her husband will alternate at the controls.

She has been flying for several years. Her most ambitious achievement was a flight to China in 1930. From there she went to Vancouver by steamer and flew across the United States to New York.

Portland, Aug. 1 (AP)—Senator Frederick Steiwer arrived home today from Washington, D. C., tired from the long session of congress and eager to get out on Oregon's fishing streams as soon as possible.

Steiwer said that he and Senator McNary will urge the appointment of an Oregon man on the board of home loan bank. He said five men were being considered but would give the name of only one, A. C. Dixon of Eugene, whose name had already been mentioned publicly.

He said he also hoped to see a branch of the home loan bank, one of 12 such banks to be created, opened in Portland.

Portland, Aug. 1 (AP)—Carl Donough, chairman of the Oregon democratic state central committee, said today he will leave Wednesday for New York to confer with James Farley, chairman of the national committee. Farley today summoned Donough and other western democratic leaders for a conference.

Donough, delegate to the democratic national convention, said today he will urge upon both Franklin D. Roosevelt and Farley the importance of a west coast visit by the candidate, with inclusion of Oregon in the itinerary.

Seven bids ranging from \$8789 to \$11,076 were opened today by the state board of control for the two physicians' cottages to be constructed at the Eastern Oregon hospital at Pendleton. R. H. Jones, Baker contractor, entered the low bid on the two buildings, \$8789, followed closely by S. Synnes of Portland at \$907. Provisions in contracts may alter the total figures of both, as exceptions are made for the electric contracts. The third low bid was that of P. L. Boien and Son of Portland at \$8950.

HIGHER POSTAL RATES SUSTAIN RECEIPTS HERE

The three cent letter postage which was established on July 1 is beginning to have its effect upon the receipts of the local postoffice, according to the monthly report of Postmaster John Farrar. In spite of the fact that the mailing of automobile license plates fell off more than half as compared with the month of July in 1931, the entire receipts for July this year were but \$207 short of the same period in 1932.

The total receipts for July this year were \$20,064.87, as compared with \$20,301.81 in July, 1931. Receipts from third and fourth class mail matter, in which are included license plates and advertising circulars totaled \$3,487.98 during July, as compared with \$7,355.69 for corresponding month last year.

While a few firms are delivering their monthly statements direct through their employees, in many instances this was the practice before the increase in letter postage went into effect, the postmaster states.

There has been little decrease in the volume of letter mail handled by the Salem office.

BOOTH PASTURE SWEEP BY FIRE

Koenigsberg, Aug. 1 (AP)—A communist leader was shot and stabbed to death in bed today and a prominent socialist was wounded seriously in attacks which local authorities blamed on Nazis.

Communist Leader Sauff died soon after he was attacked in his home. Socialist Leader Zilpina was in a dangerous condition from wounds inflicted by attackers, who escaped.

Arrested were made to bomb two left wing newspapers.

RAILROAD ASKS BAN ON TRUCKS

The Dalles, Ore., Aug. 1 (AP)—Despite injunction which the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railroad has granted against trucks and steamboat men who had planned moving wheat from Lyle, on the north bank of the Columbia river, to Portland, ranchers of Klickitat county, Washington, declared here today they expect to escape the effects of the ruling.

The temporary injunction was granted on the railroad's plea that its facilities were adequate to serve the river communities and that the road would suffer "irreparable damage" if river and truck competition were permitted.

Wheat growers who visited here today from Washington said that to escape the injunction their grain will be loaded at North Dalles, across the river from there. They said 75 tons of grain already assembled will move by boat immediately.

A hearing will be held in Goldendale, Wash., on Aug. 9 to clear the points at issue arising from the injunction plea. Besides setting up the argument of adequate facilities to serve, the railroad insisted it has a prior title to a tract of land at Lyle which the steamboat operators are using for dock facilities.

The railroad's action brought criticism from the Wasco (Oregon) County Growers' cooperative which now is loading heavy tonnage of wheat at the Big Edley warehouse on Celilo canal for early river shipment.

ASK FEDERAL AID ON COAST HIGHWAY

Waldport, Ore., Aug. 1 (AP)—Directors of the coast highway association, meeting here yesterday, voted to ask the state highway commission to apply for a loan from the reconstruction finance corporation to build five timber bridges on the Oregon coast highway, thereby closing all gaps on the route.

The directors advocated nominal tolls on the bridges to liquidate the indebtedness, the tolls to be removed as soon as the loan could be repaid.

The directors also adopted a resolution similar to that of the Pacific highway association endorsing legislation authorizing use of state gas tax funds in publicizing the Oregon highway system.

The directors will meet again August 27 and 28 at Bandon.

UNITED STATES IN FENCING FINALS

Olympic Armory, Los Angeles, Aug. 1 (AP)—The United States fencers team won its way to the finals in the Olympic fencing events today by defeating France. At the same time Italy defeated Denmark 12 to 4 and was to meet the Americans in the finals this afternoon.

France and the United States were tied at eight-all when the semi-finals were over but the Americans were declared winners when the referees decided they score more individual points against contestants than the French. It was the first time in the current history of the Olympic games that France lost to America.

WAGE PLEA FAILS PAPERS SUSPEND

Butte, Mont., Aug. 1 (AP)—Butte newspapers and commercial printing shops suspended operations today when wage adjustment negotiations failed.

The employers asked for a \$1 reduction in basic pay, which proposal was rejected by the allied printing crafts.

It was expected today that negotiations would be resumed within the next few days and that the suspension would not extend beyond this week.

Brothers Reunited After Fifty Years

Portland, Ore., Aug. 1 (AP)—Three brothers who last saw each other half a century ago in Germany were reunited here yesterday.

Otto Setzer, of Froburg, Germany, ex-chief railway inspector for the German government, came to this country a few weeks ago, and joined Gustav Setzer in St. Paul, Minn. The two came on to Portland and Sunday met a third brother, Paul, here for the occasion from his home in Bingen, Wash.

SAVINGS BANKS SHOW BIG GAIN

New York, Aug. 1 (AP)—Mutual savings banks of the United States showed an increase of 72,468 deposits the first half of this year, the National Association of Mutual Savings Banks announced today.

The additions brought the total of all accounts in mutual savings banks to 13,432,139, a high point for all time, and their aggregate savings amounted to \$9,984,243,517.

The report points out that "it is an interesting sidelight that deposits for the full year, June 30, 1931 to June 30, 1932, showed an increase of \$7,275,536, although the total deposits for the first six months this year showed a decrease of \$45,770,868."

The average amount of money per depositor dropped slightly from \$750.77 January 1 last to \$743.50 June 30.

FEAR EPIDEMIC IN BONUS CAMPS

Johnstown, Pa., Aug. 1 (AP)—Fear that an epidemic of disease would sweep the B. E. F. encampment here caused Dr. Charles Shaffer, medical director of Somerset county and Mayor McCloskey of Johnstown to charter an airplane and fly to Harrisburg today to appeal personally to Governor Pinchot for aid.

"Conditions are terrible," Dr. Shaffer said. "We need cots and medical supplies. Something must be done at once or the entire camp will be stricken. More than 30 men are in hospitals now."

Dr. Shaffer said he would ask the governor to supply cots, tents and rolling equipment from the state national guard, and station state health officers at the camp.

PARAGUAY CLAIMS BOLIVIA TO BLAME

Washington, Aug. 1 (AP)—Paraguay formally notified the state department here today that it considered Bolivian attacks in the Chaco as "acts of hostility without formal declaration of war and hence contrary to international law."

Paraguay at the same time filed a disclaimer of responsibility for "acts that may occur in the future as a consequence of the aggressions of Bolivia."

DOORS OF BOISE BANK UNOPENED

Boise, Idaho, Aug. 1 (AP)—The Boise City National bank, third in size of Boise's three banks, today was turned over to the comptroller of the currency for liquidation.

Closing of the bank was the first instance of the kind in Boise in 10 years.

The bank listed at the call of June 30, deposits of \$2,521,963, of which officers said a large part was public money protected by bonds. It had a capital stock and surplus of \$450,000.

P. F. Johnson, chairman, announced last night that the bank would not open this morning and said an application would be made to the reconstruction finance corporation for funds to expedite liquidation.

COMMUNISTS PLAN NEW BONUS MARCH

Portland, Aug. 1 (AP)—The communist party and its subsidiary organizations here have organized a rank-and-file committee to form a new bonus army of veterans and unemployed to march on Washington, D. C.

Plans for the contemplated march were discussed by several speakers at the courthouse Saturday. But no definite date was set. A recruiting headquarters for the new bonus army has been opened in a downtown building.

The Journal said several speakers at Saturday's meeting advocated violence and urged all recruits to carry arms.
