the tabulation is not considered complete. Maris estimates a probable total of 45,000 registered including counties not reporting with a total of 97,000 dependents.

Marion county had available \$38,800 for material relief with \$10,000 available from other than county sources, while it has \$39,300 for road work and the state \$43,200 in this county.

The county court from here reported there would be none in this county next winter without shelter. It stated it expected to have a central warehouse here for the handling of products for relief work, that it favored exchange of commodities between the counties. The court had not indicated today how, in any manner, it expects to ask for assistance from the \$300,000,000 federal relief fund.

sites from Virginia to New York state had been offered. Consideration of these offers awaited Waters' return to inspect the tract today.

E. W. Lambert of Michigan, one of Waters' aides was here inspecting water supplies and cabin and barrack buildings.

With Lambert were a score of other veterans, some with their families. They dumped their meagre belongings on the ground and made out as best they could.

Mrs. Edgell, who has become the "mother" of the bedraggled bonus army, is a low-down widow with an "eastern shore" drawl. She owns a small sanitarium in Cantonville, Md., and has given shelter to 11 veterans there. She sold 25 acres of the woodland to Waters for \$1 and arranged for leasing nearly 175 acres additional.

Mrs. Edgell said she wasn't interested in the bonus question, "but I was horrified when I saw how these men who fought for our country such a few years ago were prodded with bayonets and gassed by bombs in the hands of American soldiers. There will be no bayoneting in this haven."

"I'm no communist," she continued, "I'm an eastern shoreman from Talbot county. My ancestors fought in the Revolution, the war of 1812 and 1861—and I voted for Hoover. A lot of us who did are hanging our heads in shame, too; he's been a Frankenstein ever since."

out by comrades wearing gas masks. Finn died on the sidewalk, a priest bending over him to administer the last rites of the church. Hotel lack-lusters, a few minutes later, were sweeping up the blood stained glass, dumping it in a laundry hamper, to be sifted for the scattered jewels it might contain.

Louis Hardin, fireman, died after being brought to safety; a fourth body is unidentified.

Thirteen men, gassed below, were taken to hospitals. Three of them may die.

One-time home of Arthur Brisbane, scene of gay dinners to Lindbergh and other trans-Atlantic fliers, home of opera stars, actors, bankers, brokers and a cross-section of the fashionable world, the Ritz Tower houses many luxurious apartments, decorated by the first artists of the day.

Smarmy, disheveled women climbed down fire-escapes today when the elevators stopped. White-haired bankers, in gay scarfs, linen suits and pajamas, groped through the richly furnished lobby with hand torches. Lights were out throughout the building. Maids in caps and aprons in upper windows, waved at firemen below. A line of a dozen uncombed firemen was stretched across the pavement of 37th street, site of art galleries, antique shops and smart courtesiers, while white clad ambulance surgeons toiled over them with respirators.

In an address to his 400,000 storm troops he said:

"An overwhelming victory has been ordered to annihilate the lord mayor, lady mayores, magistrates, town clerk, and chief citizens whenever they meet."

ATTEND "THIRD DEGREE" PROBE

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SENATORS NAMED FOR BLACKMAIL

New York, Aug. 1 (UP)—Two United States senators were the intended victims of a blackmail plot suggested in evidence police said they found in a dingy room here with the bodies of an attractive platinum blonde, her murder suspect companion, a counterfeiter, his equipment, and apurpos 55 bills.

Police did not name the senators. They said the little black record book containing their names and those of other prominent men disappeared almost under their eyes during the investigation.

Pictures of the woman with several men, apparently surprised by the photographers, were found with the book.

And \$900 in 55 bills produced in the "very excellent" counterfeiting material was found in the room.

The name of the blonde was unknown early today. Her companion was Robert L. Conroy, sought by police since 1928 as a suspect in a Toledo, Ohio, murder.

Light and a flapping window shade caused a taxicab driver to call police to Conroy's flat yesterday. They found the woman's body, with two bullet wounds in her head, lying fully clothed near the bathroom floor. Near her was Conroy's body, a bullet through his head.

A hand printing press, copper plates, photographic "dark room" equipment, and 198 counterfeit 55 bills drying on a strip of blotting paper were found.

The bodies of the woman and Conroy were found in the room.

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
