

LITTLE ACTION IS RESULT FOR COUNCIL HOUR

Woodburn—Much talk and little action characterized the regular meeting of the Woodburn city council Tuesday night. The revised rates of the state industrial accident commission came up for lengthy discussion and it was decided upon motion that the city pay the new rate except in the case of fire chief, his rate being completed by the commission on a basis of \$30 salary per month when as a matter of fact his salary is \$10 per month.

The city attorney was instructed to secure a deed to the Nick Miller property, which was purchased by the city on a sale for delinquent assessments upon which the necessary 12 months for redemption has expired.

A resolution was read from the Oregon Fire Chief's association, prohibiting the storage of more than 1000 gallons in one tank or more than three tanks on each lot, tanks to be four feet under ground. An ordinance embodying these restrictions was submitted by the association and was referred to the ordinance committee.

Plans for the marriage to be contracted on the Allen building were examined and approved.

A complaint was made of the condition of the sidewalk on East Lincoln street near the high school, and the street commissioner was instructed to make necessary repairs.

An offer by two citizens to pay their delinquent water bills with wood was accepted and the recorder was instructed to receive wood in payment at the market price, not to exceed \$3 per cord for four-foot second growth.

Bills in the amount of \$1700 were approved and ordered paid.

A report was made of the cost of the recently completed water extension, which includes replacing old mains, installing new mains and hydrants at a cost of approximately \$6000.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR FROLIC ALONG COAST

POLK FARMERS REVEAL WATER IS BENEFICIAL

Dallas—A group of approximately 25 farmers and business men of Polk county visited the farms of J. A. Campbell and G. W. Brandstetter in company with J. R. Beck, county agent, for the purpose of inspecting their tracts of Ladino clover which are making remarkable showings under irrigation.

On the Campbell place water is pumped from a storage basin, formed by damming Salt creek, to a 20-acre tract by means of a 4-inch centrifugal pump powered by a 7½ horsepower motor. The water is distributed to the various sections by means of a 12-inch line pipe with gate valves at convenient locations. Irrigation was started June 7 and will be discontinued about August 20. A dairy herd of 43 head has been pastured on the tract since April 1. The herd production averaged 1000 pounds per day. In a short talk, Campbell outlined for the benefit of his visitors the methods he followed in his project and his plans for the future. These include the sewing of another 10-acre field to irrigate the field and make a new initial venture in Ladino clover. The group also enjoyed a short talk by Prof. Brant of the state college extension service.

The whole party with a few exceptions next visited the G. W. Brandstetter place where an entirely different system of irrigation is in use. This is a gravity layout and the water is obtained from an old power ditch. Due to an unfortunate accident early this year the owner has not accomplished all he planned to do, but his project has expanded nevertheless. As on the Campbell place the field was thrown open for pasture on April 1, when a herd of 16 was turned in. At present only three acres are available for this purpose but the herd has been cut to eight head. One and a half acres have been set aside for seed and at this time the stand appears to be heavy and very thick.

Brandstetter explained the whole project in a short talk and stated that at the moment eight farmers used the ditch with about 100 acres under irrigation. This will be increased until when it is completed 18 acres will be benefited. A talk by Art King of the extension service on the types of pumps to use, was given during this visit. Both men who are highly enthusiastic over the possibilities of irrigation, acquired through personal experience, stated that about an almost unknown quantity in their herds.

Phil Sheridan's Blockhouse Gets New Cedar Roof

Dayton—A new cedar shake roof, resembling as nearly as possible, the old one that was beginning to leak during the past several years, is being put on the Phil Sheridan blockhouse in the city park by the municipal board. Clyde Cook and Eli Kuris is in charge of the work. The shakes are hand-hewn and are from local cedar.

The Phil Sheridan blockhouse was built at Grand Ronde in 1855 when the white people feared an outbreak of the tribes of Indians brought to the reservation. But the Indians were peaceable under the kindly counsel of Joel Palmer, general of Indian affairs at that time, and it was he who donated the townsite of Dayton. It was in his honor that J. G. Lewis went before the city council on October 10, 1910 and advocated the securing from the United States government the old blockhouse and place it in the Dayton city park as a monument in memory of General Palmer, and through the necessary proceedings the request was granted and with the aid of Indians on June 9, 1911, the blockhouse arrived, knocked down and re-erected. It was completed August 11 of that year and has for 22 years been one of Dayton's valued relics of pioneer days, and the city officials in past years have always tried to preserve the original pioneer appearance of it, and it is the continued wish that prompted the use of the shakes instead of any modern roof material and those in charge of the work have that in mind also in telling of the repair work.

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Assault Costs \$5; But White Is Broke
