

INDIAN SCHOOL FURLOUGHS ARE NOW IN ORDER

Chemawa—Congress having passed the bill providing for furloughs in lieu of vacations, most of the Indian school employees are now taking their time off. The period is for 24 working days, which may be taken all at the same time or taken a few days at a time during the fiscal year. Most of the instructors are taking theirs during August but other employees who cannot be spared at this time will take their furloughs in short periods at the most convenient times. The financial cut for the year amounts to \$1.3 per cent, which is deducted monthly from the pay check no matter when the employee is off duty. Rent for quarters is also deducted from the pay check regardless of whether they have been used during the furlough or not.

CRASH VICTIM BRINGS ACTION

Dallas—An aftermath of an automobile accident which took place on May 20, 1932 cropped up Thursday when C. B. Priesen filed a complaint in the circuit court against Harold Holmes seeking damages in the amount of \$1000.

The plaintiff avers that the defendant drove at an excess speed, that he was careless and negligent and failed to keep a proper lookout for other traffic, that he operated his automobile on the wrong side of the highway, that he ran into and against the rear end of the plaintiff's car as he was turning off the highway into his private driveway and that he failed to give warning of his approach by means of his horn or any other means. As the result of the defendant's negligence the plaintiff was badly bruised and damaged suffering from a badly bruised left side, the ligaments and cartilage of his ribs torn and sprained, a deep gash on the left side of his head, and his left hip sprained. The plaintiff asserts that he has not yet recovered from the above injuries which have caused him great physical and mental pain in addition to severe shock, and that prior to the accident he was capable of earning \$5.00 per day. As the result of the crash his model T Ford valued at \$100 was completely demolished. \$350 are asked as special damages with \$1150 as general damages with \$100 to cover the loss of the car.

The crash took place on the Salem-Dallas highway about two and a half miles east of town.
