OREGON RUNNER LOSES RACE AS OPPONENT CLEARLY FOULS HIM

Schapps Team Of Ball Pounders To Conclude Season

With the final games of the State league season just around the corner, the Salem Senators will make one more desperate effort to stem their losing streak of the past two weeks when they clash with Schapps of Portland at Olinger field next Sunday afternoon. Much more timely hitting than has been displayed by the Senators, the Schapps team expects to turn back the horsehide pounding tactics of the Portlanders, who will be assisted in their efforts by Heller, the moundsman who last Sunday equaled "Sneak" Wilson's one hit mark.

The Senators displayed signs last Sunday of emerging from something resembling a batting slump although their hits failed to produce the necessary runs. The hitting of Walt Erickson was particularly gratifying. Heretofore this well-liked young fellow has been trying to put the ball over the railroad track on every swing and as a result he frequently placed them where the fielders had little to do. Sunday, however, he connected safely three times and placed them where his opponents had little chance to retrieve the ball until he was safely perched on base.

The defense of the Senators has been just about all that could be asked for so if an offense can be developed which would yield runs, the Senators may yet finish the season near the top.

Eugene will arrive Sunday to pull the West Side youngsters down on an even basis with the Townies and thus remain in the running while Albany and Bend, occupying the cellar jointly will scrap it out on the central Oregon diamond.

Sunday's game at Olinger field which begins at 2:30 will mark the final home contest of the regular season for the Senators.

BETHEL FARMERS WILL BAN HUNTERS

Bethel—Hunters will again be excluded from this district. This was decided at the meeting of the Farmers' Union Monday night.

The ban on hunting was in force here last year for the first time, and was such a success that the farmers wish to continue with it.

The committee which was in charge last year has been retained for the coming year. Harry Phillips, Arthur Spellbinder, Irvin, Bartels, all of Macleay; John Zak of Bethel and Guy Flag of Troutdale.

Any farmer living in the reserve district may give permission to anyone to hunt on his own land, but even a farmer living in the reserve must ask permission before hunting on the land of another member.

The hunting reserve is to be well placarded with "No Hunting" signs and identification cards given out to the farmers living therein.

A request is to be made that a number of local men be appointed to serve as local game wardens so that enforcement may be even stronger than last year.

Hunters have in previous years killed poultry, shot animals and abused their privileges until these measures have become necessary.

Portland's invasion of southern California has produced exactly no results to date for the Beavers. The Angels beat them Friday night for the fourth straight time, 11 to 8. It was a free hitting contest, each team registering 13 hits. Portland got three homers, including one by Berger with two men on base. Los Angeles is now only two and one-half games behind the second place Hollywood Stars.

Hollywood took its second straight defeat from the Senators, 4 to 1, as Louis Vinci pitched six hit ball for Sacramento. The two defeats prevented the Stars from taking advantage of Portland's losing streak to approach first place in the percentage column.

Bert Cole pitched a seven hit game as the Missions beat Seattle 6 to 1 to even the series. John "Junk" Walters pitched seven innings for the Indians, being retired after the Reds had made three runs off five hits. Freitas replaced him and prevented further scoring.

Oakland took a three to one lead in the series by beating San Francisco, 2 to 0. Three hits bunched in the third inning turned the trick for the Oaks.

The Tiger star retired the first 26 Senators to face him only to have pinch hitter Dave Harris break the spell with two out in the ninth. After Harris had cracked the first ball into left field for a clean single, ruining Bridges' chance at a no-hit game, Sam Rice was retired for the final out on a bouncer to first base.

It was the second one-hit game of the year in the majors and the second by a Detroit pitcher. Earl Whitehall, veterans southpaw, allowed the St. Louis Browns only one hit on July 4 but walked two men. Bridges walked no one and fanned seven.

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Hill Proves Good Sport, Refuses To Blame Finn Pacer

Los Angeles, Aug. 6 (AP)—Ralph Hill, 24 year old lad from an Oregon farm, was the toast of the Olympic games today—a champion among champions. He gained that distinction by the manner in which he lost an important race. Obviously fouled in the 5,000 meter run by Lauri Lehtinen, of Finland, he lost to Lehtinen and had no word of protest to offer.

In fact he spent his time offering excuses for Lehtinen, world's champion at 5,000 meters, rather than advancing his own claims.

Lehtinen and Hill came into the final stretch one-two, with scarcely a yard between them, and Hill, in one of those last minute finishes, tempted to pass the Finn.

He went outside and Lehtinen, after a look over his shoulder, also turned outside, and directly in the path of the flying Hill.

The Oregonian broke his stride and turned to go inside but it was too late. Running the inside lane he finished second to Lehtinen by inches.

A boo that could be heard blocks away went up from 60,000 fans. They believed that Hill would have won the race easily without the interference that Lehtinen assertedly offered.

The United Press talked to 14 sports experts, including those of rival press associations and newspapermen of New York, Chicago, Los Angeles and Buenos Aires. In the group 13 expressed the opinion Lehtinen's foul was deliberate. The 14th thought Hill had been fouled but that the action was unintentional.

Hill, himself, was the calmest man in the stadium as everyone waited for the judges' decision.

"Fouled?" he said to the United Press in an executive interview, "well, I wouldn't care to say that."

"Did it break your stride?" he was asked.

"It tell you something," he answered. "At the end of a 5000 meter race I don't think anyone has a stride."

"Would you have won if you hadn't been fouled?"

"I haven't said that I was fouled," he answered. "It was a pretty close race and maybe I would have won."

The finish was so close that another foul and Hill would have been ahead.

"What are you going to do now?" "I guess I'll go back to the farm," Hill said.

And Hill, a tall, skinny farmer boy left the stadium for Olympic Village to pack his suitcase and go back to his Oregon farm.

A long time ago Baron Pierre de Coubertin, founder of the modern Olympic games, said the important thing is not the victory but the fight. The essential is not to have won but to have fought well.

The 5000 meter was one of the only two events decided Friday. The other was the 400 meter, won by Billy Carr, of Pennsylvania, over big Ben Eastman, Stanford university ace. Although attention was somewhat distracted by the buzz of conversation over the recently run 3000-meter, Carr and Eastman supplied a thrilling competition. The easterner won, just as he had on two recent occasions. All were in record figure.

Carr's time in winning by a stride was 46.2, faster than the 400 meter, has ever been done before. Eastman, too, broke world and Olympic records, for he was caught at 46.4. The official world record was 47, held by E. H. Liddell, of Great Britain.

FLANDERS POPPIES CUT DOWN WHEAT

Paris (AP)—The "poppies red which bloom in Flanders fields" and which inspired many poets of the World War to write of their flaming beauty in the fields cost the farmers of France this year just one million bushels of wheat.

The poppies, unknown before the war, have spread with such rapidity that they have become the greatest weed French farmers know. Some wheatfields have had their crop cut by half as a result of an invasion.
