Failure to hit in the pinches Sunday resulted in the Salem Senators meeting defeat for the third successive Sunday when they were outscored by Schapps of Portland, 5 to 2 on Olinger field. The defeat eliminates Salem from any chance at the title since but one more regular game is scheduled, that with Albany next Sunday.

While the restaurant men probably deserved to win, they were 1-2 in getting most of the breaks. Then, too, they hustled just a bit harder and gave Heller good support.

C. Wood breaking in at shortstop for the Senators made a good job of it, getting two hits and successfully handling 7 out of 8 chances. The one he missed up might easily have been called a hit.

Schapps got their runs one at a time while Salem secured its two tallies in the third on hits by Edwards and C. Wood, an error and a double steal.

The visitors scored a run in the second on two hits, a wild pitch and an outfield fly; one in the third on two hits and an error; one in the sixth on a single by Clegg and a double by Roberts; one in the seventh on four infield singles after two were down, and one in the eighth on an error, a sacrifice and a single.

Roberts, the big left fielder and first baseman who has hit eight home runs during the season, failed to get his usual circuit clout; but did manage to get a double and a single. Wilson kept the ball low and inside, which is evidently the spot where Roberts doesn't want them.

Cox, red headed first baseman, was chased from the game during the fifth inning by Umpire Mason when he threw the ball at Ashby just after the latter had crossed first base. Cox claimed Ashby slugged him as he went by. However, nobody saw the blow and when Cox refused to pipe down he was kicked out. Cox was probably a bit sensitive since he was laid out on his other appearance here when he stood on the base line as Lowell Gribble came charging down. He was forced to leave the game on that occasion, too, due to an injury to his leg.

LINCOLN WINS JUNIOR TITLE, WOODBURN 3RD

The Lincoln Cardinals of Portland won the American Legion junior baseball championship of the state Sunday when it defeated Eugene 9 to 1 on the Vaughn street diamond.

The Cards went into the final contest by defeating Woodburn Saturday afternoon 15 to 2.

The Woodburn Juniors took third place by beating The Dalles 4 to 1 in the consolation contest Sunday. Lefter, Woodburn chucker, after being hit hard in Saturday's opener came back strong Sunday afternoon against The Dalles and allowed but four hits. Kremer of The Dalles was none too liberal either, holding the Marion county champs to 5 hits.

Woodburn batters were impotent against the strong hurling of Moe Jubit, Cardinal chucker and three runs were all they could get. The berry center youths, evidently having a bad case of nerves went sky high during the initial innings, committing 10 errors, while Lefter was unable to keep his opponents from cracking the ball frequently.

The champions continued their stick work against Eugene, which beat The Dalles 11 to 8 in the second contest Saturday. Eugene was an easy victim of the Cardinals in the title mix, the winners getting four runs in the initial inning and then adding one at a time until the total of nine was reached. Eugene failed to score until the last inning when Takima went in to relieve Leven.

BRITISH ROADS REPORT SIGNS OF BETTER DAYS

London (AP)—In spite of the unfavorable factors of decreased revenue, continuing depression in the heavy industries, motor transport competition, and all other ills, British roadbuilding is feeling a brighter tone with each new day and preparing itself for a lifting of the depression.

A spokesman for the railway companies' association, representing the four big companies in which British roadbuilding is now vested, said that "while the heavy industries such as iron and steel and shipbuilding are still down, and may take some time yet to reach a turning point, there is a marked increase in the smaller trades, and the whole tone of road movement, we feel is becoming firmer."

Such an observation, in view of the key position of roadbuilding, is considered significant here. No more sensitive barometer of British trade conditions than the railways exists; their business fluctuates either upward or downward with each minute turn in general business conditions. Representing a total investment of \$5,500,000,000, they employ some 600,000 persons, whom they pay \$500,000,000 a year. The largest purchasers of iron and steel in the country, they buy 210,000 tons of steel rails alone annually, use 14,500,000 tons of coal and 21,000,000 bricks in the space of a year.

To continue the figures, since they are the best index in the case, the British railways own 66,809 houses and depots at the present time; own 22,600 locomotives, 80 hotels, 133 ships, 45,825 passenger cars, with seats enough for the entire population of Liverpool, Manchester, and Birmingham combined, and 665,134 freight cars.

The Stars finished the week four games behind Portland, and it would have been worse, but for the fact the Beavers had a bad week themselves, taking only one game out of seven with the Angels.

Earl McNeely's rejuvenated Senators beat Hollywood 5 to 3 in Stockton Sunday morning, and 2 to 1 in the afternoon at Sacramento. Ed Bryan held the Stars to four hits in the second game.

The Beavers won their only game of the Los Angeles series 12 to 4 in opening the Sunday doubleheader. The Angels took the closer, 5 to 1. San Francisco won the series from Oakland four games to three by taking both ends of the Sunday doubleheader. In the first contest the Seals pounded three Oakland pitchers for 18 hits and an 11 to 1 victory. Curt Davis was on the mound for San Francisco in the second game and set the Acorns down with only three hits, winning 1 to 0.

Pirates In Slump Drop Nine Games In Row, Lose 2 To Braves

The New York Yankees continue to coast far out in front of the rest of the American league pack but there are prospects of another bitter stretch duel in the National. Where the Yankees led by eight and one-half games with no signs of a slump, the National league race has tightened up to a point where only five games separate the league leading Pittsburgh Pirates and the fifth place Brooklyn Dodgers.

Pittsburgh, in the midst of its worst slump of the season, dropped a double bill to the Boston Braves yesterday, 2-1 and 7-6. The Corsairs now have dropped nine games in a row since opening their eastern invasion with six victories out of seven games against the New York Giants. Ed Brandt outpitched Steve Swetonic and Larry French by a slight margin in the opener.

The second game was decided in the ninth when the winning run came across on an error by young Floyd Vaughan. The Braves' triumph lifted them back into third place, a half game ahead of the idle Phillies.

The Chicago Cubs, holding second place, picked up a full game on the leaders by dividing two games with the Giants, and now trail by only a game and a half. Lon Warneke, sensational Cub rookie, stopped the giants with five hits in the opener and won, 8-2. Waite Hoyt scattered eight hits as the Giants won the nightcap, 8-1.

Brooklyn and Cincinnati also split two games. The Dodgers taking the first, 6-1 and the Reds the second, 9-5.

The Cleveland Indians, surprise contenders for the American league championship, whipped the Washington Senators twice and moved into second place, two percentage points ahead of the Philadelphia Athletics. The Indians received excellent pitching from Willis Huddlin and Jack Russell and timely batting from the cast to win 7-4 and 6-2 decisions.

The Athletics got no better than an even break with the Chicago White Sox as Ted Lyons outpitched Lefty Grove in the opener, 3-1. Tony Freitas, Athletic rookie, held the White Sox to three hits to win the second game, 1-0.

The Yankees, meanwhile, battered out 29 hits against assorted St. Louis Browns pitching and won two games, 11-5 and 6-4.

Frank Crossett, rookie Yankee shortstop, drove in eight runs during the day with two home runs and two triples. One of Babe Ruth's four hits in the opener was his 31st homer of the season.

Johnny Stone's homer with one on in the seventh gave Detroit a 1-1 verdict over the Boston Red Sox.

BRITISH RUSH 1931 CENSUS

London (AP)—In a huge, rectangular block of government buildings in West London, a small army of workers is feverishly completing the organization of data collected in the 1931 census. Gathering the original house-to-house reports is only the barest beginning of the giant task.

The full record of age, sex, color, residence, occupation, etc., of 40,000,000 persons must be transcribed from the original reports of the census-takers to a card index for permanent filing.

There must be every possible economy of detail consistent with completeness and accuracy; abbreviations and code numbers, incomprehensible to the uninitiated, are used. The data are punched on cards by girl robots, doing 500 cards an hour with fingers moving at an unbelievable rate of speed. The cards, when punched (each one has an average of 16 or 17 notations) are taken to uncanny machines, which sort and count them at the rate of 16,000 an hour.

In order to supply all the various information required, the 40,000,000 cards go through the machines 16 times. Details which cannot be conveniently recorded by machine are checked off in green ink by hand. Once filled out, the cards must be checked and rechecked before final reports may be published.

THYE AND ELRICH TO WRESTLE HERE

Heavyweight wrestlers will return to the spotlight Tuesday night when the local commission holds its weekly grappling show. Ted Thye, of Portland, of shoulder butt fame will meet Nick Elrich in the main event of two out of three falls.

Thye was shown here before but it will be the first appearance for the Serbian.

As a contrast to the big boys Dutch Merlin and Art O'Reilly, two speedy wrestlers, have been matched for the preliminary.

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FLYING SAFE FOR BABIES

New York (AP)—For a long time there has been a discussion of the question of how airplane flights affect small babies. Apparently United Air Lines has answered the question. Within the last week among its passengers was a 25-day-old infant, Virginia Stoner, who was a passenger with her mother, Mrs. D. M. Stoner, of Hollywood, on a 1,200-mile flight from Seattle to San Diego. The same week Michael Dix, aged four months, flew with his mother from San Francisco to Chicago.

These infant passengers were accepted after expert medical opinion had concurred that there is no limit to the age of which it is safe to carry children or babies, providing an elevation of 10,000 or 12,000 feet is not exceeded.

As regards oxygen content of the air, that need not be considered at all. However, change in atmospheric pressure, such as are experienced at different altitudes, can constitute a different problem for babies. Consequently, airplane stewardesses waken children when coming in for a landing and get them to swallow a teaspoonful of water, the swallowing process equalizing the pressure in their middle ear with that of the outside atmosphere pressure.

RIDE RAILWAY
Hamilton, Bermuda (AP)—According to the report of the Bermuda railway for the first six months of its operation, 13,903 dogs and bicycles were carried as paying passengers. Passengers by ordinary and special trains numbered 297,892, riding for almost a million and a half passenger miles. The railway is only 22 miles long and is capitalized at about \$4,000,000.
