 HITLER REBUFFED**  
 (From page one)

As a result of today's conference with the aged field marshal, Hitler will remain outside the cabinet. Franz von Papen will continue as chancellor. Meanwhile, it is learned that the government is seriously considering proclamation of a so-called "state of emergency", somewhat similar to martial law, in event today's conversations have proven fruitless in composing the troubled political situation. If effected it would be designed to forestall a possibly violent attempt by the Nazi to gain power. Hitler arrived at Von Hindenburg's palace at 4:15 p. m. After a day in which he is reliably reported to have rejected both the posts of vice-chancellor and the post of Prussian premier, offered him in an earlier conference with Chancellor von Schleicher. He had demanded chancellorship, and had gone on to President Von Hindenburg to get it. Their conversation together lasted but 20 minutes. "Before my conscience and the responsibility for such a move," Von Hindenburg is reported to have said in answer to Hitler's demand for full chancellorship power. Hitler thereupon left the palace. The president, according to reliable authority, offered Hitler participation in the government, leaving it to the Nazi leader's own discretion whether he would personally assume a portfolio or indirectly be represented by other Nazi leaders in the government councils. Demand for full executive power remained Hitler's answer. Parting, the veteran president admonished the fiery Nazi chief, urging him to serve the best interests of the country. Von Papen attended the audience in which Von Hindenburg received Hitler. Since the Von Papen government will now continue in office, unchanged, political observers here foresee even more sharp and bitter Nazi opposition to the policies hereafter.

The report recommended creation of an area of stability among countries regulating their currencies in relation to sterling and avoidance of wide day-to-day fluctuations between sterling and gold. It also said that a rise in the general level of wholesale prices was the most desirable means for facilitating such a result, but that international action was urgently necessary in that connection. This was interpreted as bringing the United States directly into the picture. The immediately adjacent observation that there must be an adjustment of political, economic, financial and monetary factors which have caused the breakdown of the gold standard in many countries and which, if not adjusted, inevitably would lead to another breakdown of whatever international standard might be set up, was taken to suggest redistribution of the world's gold supply now concentrated in the United States and France.

sociation fixed on milk as on other farm products. Whoever the responsibility for the milk war, it had reached the stage today where the producers declared they will give away milk to dispose of their produce and at the same time put added pressure on distributors who claim the war has not seriously interfered with their business. Dumping of hundreds of gallons of milk being brought to market by independent producers satisfied with the \$1 per hundred offered have been dumped by strikers. In addition to the activities of the milk strikers, an act of violence by the general strike group was seen in the dumping of a cargo of cream from a truck of the Cherokee Creamery Co. Plans for prosecuting the perpetrators of this violence were under way.

them." Let us inform you of this fact: The initiation of this ruinous bill was under consideration by a secret group of Corvallis business men and members of the Corvallis chamber months before Henry Zorn, president of the Marion county, or Hector MacPherson, alleged co-author of it, had so much as been approached on the matter. "For the reason that you say you do not know who 'these men' were, we refer you to Dr. Johnson, Bankers Wilson and Porter, J. N. McPhaden, one of your biggest private owners; Mr. Claude Ingalls, your postmaster and editor of the Gazette Times and Mr. E. L. Getz, Ford dealer, and for 12 years a resident of your city. They are all members of the Corvallis chamber of commerce, and Getz and Ingalls are directors. "Approximately a month before the Zorn-MacPherson bill showed itself publicly, these Corvallis men asked for and secured a private meeting at Eugene with four prominent citizens of Eugene. The Corvallis men demanded the meeting in the interest of 'harmonization.' But, when they got there, Mr. Ingalls suggested that it would be a good thing for Corvallis and Eugene to initiate a measure, which among other things would return the school of commerce to Corvallis; give Corvallis some other courses; remove the law school to Salem; do away with the school of journalism and in return for these put all the work of the three normal schools on the university campus. "For fear, President Whiteside, that you have not as yet been advised of the result of the interview, it may be stated that Eugene refused to party to the plot. "Before the bill was filed and application made for a ballot title, Corvallis interests, still on the aggressive, sought another meeting. At this meeting Bankers Wilson and Porter, reinforced by Banker Woodcock, who is treasurer of the Corvallis chamber of commerce, reappeared at Eugene in the company of Dr. Johnson. This time the Corvallis men expressed themselves as disapproving of the idea of the proposed initiative measure. They said they wanted to head it off but—and mark this well—certain 'radical' local Corvallis people were insisting on it. "They thought," however, that if
