

GAS STORAGE IS DISCUSSED AT WOODBURN

Woodburn—The Woodburn council meeting Tuesday night was somewhat of a washout as far as action was concerned and no business of importance developed. Some time was spent talking over the merits and demerits of the ordinance relative to the storage of gasoline recently submitted by the state fire marshal but it was the opinion of the council that the oil companies and dealers should be consulted before any action is taken. It is a settled fact that the city needs a new ordinance on this subject, the one in existence being entirely obsolete, but the ordinance submitted seems to be rather drastic for local conditions.

Sidewalks came up as usual and it was decided upon motion that the cement walk near the high school should be repaired with three new blocks instead of attempting to raise the broken blocks which have been causing trouble and the street commissioner was instructed to have the necessary work done. The condition of a portion of the walk on Bottle avenue was also brought up and steps taken to remedy it.

A claim was made for rental for the hitching rack now in use abutting the Cammack property at the corner of First and Garfield street, the owner claiming that he had not given permission for its erection there. The rack was moved to its present location a few years ago from the block near the postoffice but it occupies the space usually occupied by a sidewalk. The council did not see that there was any merit in the claim. They agreed however, to remove the rack if the property owner would construct a cement sidewalk in its place. The rack has become exceedingly popular since the time limit on auto licenses has expired and many farmers are going back to the "one horse show."

LACK OF EVIDENCE ON ASSAULT CHARGE

Independence—The case of State of Oregon vs. Staley for assault and battery came up for trial Monday in the justice court before Judge McIntosh. Elmer Barnhart, district attorney, represented the state and the defendant presented his own case.

Two witnesses were heard for the plaintiff, Mrs. Peter Diehm and Mrs. Edna Bartel, and Mrs. Beatrice Staley testified in her own behalf, she being the complaining witness against her husband, Sherman Staley. After hearing all of the testimony the case was dismissed for lack of evidence.

The court admonished the participants to go back to their camp home and patch up their grievances and make peace with each other. Tuesday morning they packed up their belongings and left for parts unknown. They came here from Portland last spring to work in the hop yards, being camped on the Titus ranch.

The courtroom was filled to capacity to hear this case discussed and opinions were divided about equally as to which made the better showing. It was another of those unfortunate cases where man and his wife, both being out of work and in bad circumstances, cannot seem to disagree, and try to settle their disputes by brute force. Failing in this they resort to our courts of justice to air their troubles to an unfriendly world.

Harrisburg Trio In Junior Court For Infractions

Albany—Homer White, 17, alleged third member of a Harrisburg gang, has been sentenced to the state reform school for boys at Woodburn. White was accused of petty larceny and of setting fire to a deserted building.

Other members of the trio, which has figured recently in juvenile court on petty larceny charges are Joseph Reeling and Wayne Tanton. Reeling and Tanton had already been sentenced to a year in jail and paroled to Sheriff Herbert Shelton.

WEBER IS INJURED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Stayton—Rudolph Weber of Sublimity was taken to the Stayton hospital Monday morning suffering severe face lacerations and body injuries sustained when he was riding in a car driven by Frank Bell of Sublimity when it collided with a car driven by L. W. Howland of Salem.

The accident occurred two miles north of Sublimity at the junction of the Stayton-Silver Creek Falls road when Bell made the turn west towards Shaw and Howland continued east toward Silver Creek. In the Bell car were Mr. and Mrs. Bell and Mrs. Weber, while Howland was alone. None of the others were injured but Bell's car was considerably damaged and Howland's was practically demolished. Bell is a well known resident of Sublimity and president of the Affiliated Telephone association and Howland is employed on the Cam Matheny place as a wood cutter.

COMPLAINTS FILED IN CIRCUIT COURT

Dallas—Two more complaints have been filed in the circuit court by the Prudential Savings & Loan association, seeking the foreclosure on real property which had been offered as security on loans made by the company.

The first involves J. Wayne Baker, Minnie J. Baker, his wife and others, including the State Accident Industrial commission. The original note was for the sum of \$1500 and the amount still unpaid is \$859.95 with interest at 10 per cent from July 15, 1931.

The second was for defendants E. W. Mason and Kathryn Mason, his wife. The original loan was for \$2862 and the amount still due is \$1178.91 with interest at 10 per cent from December 15, 1931. In both cases the plaintiff claim ownership of the first lien on the respective pieces of property and seek to have them sold by the sheriff in the manner prescribed by law in order that the judgment sought may be satisfied.

UNLOADED GUN INJURY CAUSE

Silverton—E. A. Domogalla of Bethany road, is suffering from powder burns sustained when an "unloaded" gopher gun shot him in the face and eyes about 7 o'clock

Monday morning when he was carrying it across the yard, intending to reset it. Domogalla remarked that he had heard the report of the gun earlier in the morning, and when he went to look at it the trigger was down, so he presumed the cartridge had been exploded, but apparently such was not the case for in some way when he attempted to remove what he thought was the empty shell the explosion occurred,

causing the injury, the exact extent of which cannot yet be determined. He is under the care of a physician at his home. Several hours were necessary in removing the powder from the eyeballs and face, both of which are painfully burned, but it is believed not sufficiently deep to cause permanent injury to the eyes. The facial burns appear to be deep. Domogalla will be confined to a dark room for several days until

the inflammation can be controlled. His left eye seems to have received the greatest force of the explosion.
