

JUNGLES OFFER HOME TO MANY; FARMERS READY

Independence—A number of the hop growers who have early hops are preparing to begin operations on the first of next week, among these are the Wierich ranch, L. D. Patton, Mrs. Julius Pineda, D. P. MacCarthy, Homer Wood, V. M. De-Cosier, J. C. Collins, Frank Turner and Sloper & Patton. The early hops are mostly small lots and small crews will be transported from different yards to harvest these.

The late hops will not begin until after the first of the month as they are making good growth now, owing to the recent rains.

Many hop pickers have arrived in advance and are having considerable trouble in finding camping privileges as the grower who is not ready for the harvesting of the late hops will not permit campers to his camp ground until the harvest is ready. Considerable expense is entailed by the grower to furnish food, water, bedding and campers to his camp ground until the harvest is ready. Many times food has to be furnished at the expense of the management of the yards, either by gifts or forage.

Those who have garden patches near their camp grounds have armed guards camped nearby for its protection. There seems to be a tendency on the part of some of these early transients to think that they are entitled to a living and they are going to get it by fair or foul means.

The sheriff's office has been called upon to appoint special deputies throughout the district for the protection of property and safety of the inhabitants.

In the jungle camp across the river from this city there are several hundred people camped who have made very little provision for a livelihood, and some are becoming dependents already. Foraging for fruits, vegetables and garden truck is being resorted to by some. A few families brought enough provisions for a short time but having to divide with some of their less fortunate neighbors are being forced to write home for more funds. It is expected that as soon as the early hop picking begins some of this shortage will be relieved.

SLOPER HARDWARE FIRM DISSOLVED

The Sloper Hardware is located in the arduous building on Main street two doors south of the Farmer's State bank building. They handle a full line of hardware, plumbing supplies, auto accessories and electrical supplies. Mrs. C. O. Sloper, who has been bookkeeper for the firm will continue to assist in the store and Norval Taylor, a nephew of Sloper will also be an assistant as clerk.

LINN SCHOOLS SHOW BALANCE FOR PAST YEAR

Albany—Linn county's school cost total during the past year was \$525,938.41 for the 134 districts in the county, according to the annual report of Mrs. Edna Geer, county superintendent of schools. The audited reports of the clerks of the various districts supplied the reports.

Total income during the year was \$377,666.78, leaving a cash balance for the districts at the close of the 1931-32 year of \$148,271.63. The valuation of the school districts is \$30,044,456, of which \$11,017,020 is the valuation of the non-high school districts.

Outstanding school obligations at the close of the year were \$32,969.21. Of this, \$10,100 is in bonds and interest bearing warrants, \$22,969.21 in current warrants and \$2,413.75 in borrowed money.

Teachers' salaries accounted for the larger part of the expenditures, approximately three-fifths. The aggregate amount of money paid to teachers, including superintendents and principals, was \$300,193.19.

ERECTION OF BRIDGE WILL BE DEFERRED

Scio—State engineers, in company with the Linn county engineer and members of the county court, recently have investigated sites on the South Santiam river near Crabtree with the purpose of deciding on a location for the new bridge to be placed over that stream at the crossing which has been maintained for half a century, and which was taken out by high water last spring.

This bridge will be on the Scio-Lebanon road which recently has been designated by the state highway commission as a secondary highway, and which is to receive attention at the hands of the state commission in the regular order of business of that body, it has been announced.

Much of the material for the new bridge is to be salvaged from the present highway bridges at Jefferson, according to statements emanating from the state commission. As the new bridge at Jefferson will not be completed until some time during the latter part of next summer, it is believed the structure over the South Santiam near Scio may be deferred until 1934.

A temporary crossing on the South Santiam has been in use for two months and serves the purpose adequately for the present. However, it is believed this bridge may be swept away if the river attains the proportions next year that it did last spring. The cost of putting in this temporary crossing is comparatively negligible, it is stated.

For several weeks following the freshest last spring farmers residing in the vicinity of the old Sanderson bridge complained of the great inconvenience caused by the removal
