

VARIED CASES BEFORE JUDGE AT WOODBURN

Woodburn — The preliminary hearing of Lloyd Ryan Porter, 21, charged by W. Ramp of Brooks with forgery, was held in the Woodburn justice court Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. Witnesses for the state were W. Howard Ramp and Sam Ramp. Blaine McCord represented the defendant.

Porter, who claim he is a mechanic and has lived in Oregon since January, 1932, did not deny cashing the check but said he received it from another fellow who had been working for A. M. Jernan by whom the check was signed. He declared he was innocent of the forgery and did not know that the check was forged.

The check was made out to Lewis Cranfield and endorsed by Lewis Cranfield. Porter denied that he had endorsed it. He offered to pay the amount of the check and the court costs if Ramp would drop the case. This Ramp did not seem disposed to do and Porter was held to answer to the circuit court, his bail being fixed at \$500. In lieu of bail he was taken to the county jail.

John Schafer and Norvin Strange entered a plea of not guilty to the charge of unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor and their trial was set for August 23 at 10 o'clock. Schafer is also charged with driving a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor and will be tried on this charge at the same time. Bail was fixed at \$250 and they were taken to the county jail.

The trial of Francis Krebs, who was arrested July 4 for driving while intoxicated, will also be heard at 10 o'clock, August 23. The trial has been postponed, once on account of the absence of the prosecuting witness and once on account of the district attorney being occupied with other cases.

Raymond Gagner entered a plea of not guilty to the charge of larceny, the complaint being filed by Evelyn Ballantine. He is accused of making away with a hoe, punch bar, bar and bit, pruning shears and other tools. On account of the youth being but 18 years of age and having no attorney and no witnesses his case was continued until August 22 at 10 o'clock. Blaine McCord was appointed to represent him.

Harry Levy charged with driving a truck on a public highway at a speed in excess of 35 miles an hour, having in fact been traveling 50 miles an hour, entered a plea of guilty to the charge and was given a fine of \$15 and costs. Having no money he was taken to the county jail.
