

HIGHER HOUSE HAS INTEREST OF M'PHERSON

Albany—Hector Macpherson, Lin county representative in the lower house of the state legislature, and one of the principal backers of the Zorn-Macpherson bill, admitted to press representatives Saturday that he had ambitions for the Lin county seat which will be vacant if and when Senator Willard L. Marks of Albany resigns his post to accept the position of referee in bankruptcy.

Macpherson stated that should Captain Mark V. Weatherford run as the democratic candidate, he would not resign from his post and run for the seat.

Republicans launched a boom here Saturday for C. E. Williamson, Albany banker and chairman of the Lin county republican central committee, for state senator. Samuel Garland, Lebanon, is also being mentioned to fill the vacancy. Senator Garland is a former senator of this county.

Mr. Williamson has made no statement in regard to the nomination, but those associated with him feel that he will accept the nomination if it is offered to him.

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WOODBURN HAS FEW VACANCIES IN ITS SCHOOLS

Woodburn—The Woodburn schools will open September 19 with a teaching force practically the same as last year. One teacher in the high school faculty will be eliminated and salaries have been cut 10 per cent of the amount paid last year. In spite of the uncertainty of the outcome of the high school tuition law the school buses will operate as usual and provision will be made to care for the usual number of students from outside districts.

The teaching force of the grade schools is complete but a few vacancies remain to be filled in the high school faculty.

Superintendent V. D. Bain is putting in most of his time during the remainder of the vacation period getting in touch with those who plan to enter high school for the first time this fall. He is especially anxious to meet the parents of the new pupils and to that end is going about through the country visiting the pupils in their homes. He particularly requests any new students that he may not be able to see him and talk over their plans before the beginning of the school term.

A new innovation that is to be tried out this year which should be of interest to freshmen is the plan of renting text books to the freshman class. The school board has purchased the necessary text books and they will be rented to the students at a nominal charge, probably about \$2.25 or less for the year, thus eliminating an outlay of five or six dollars for books for the first year. The plan will not be an additional burden to the taxpayers as the money expended will eventually come back to the district for rental of the books. If the plan works as well as expected it will probably be extended to the upper classes next year.
