

DRUNK DRIVING CHARGE FAILS; COURT PACKED

Woodburn—John Shafer, charged with driving an automobile on a public highway while in an intoxicated condition, was acquitted of the charge in a jury trial held at the city hall Tuesday afternoon. Walter L. Toole was attorney for the defense and the state was represented by Lyle Pace. Members of the jury were Bert Ryers, Warren Haskins, George Sweney, John Fikan and Glenn Goulet.

On account of the intense interest in the proceedings the court was transferred from Judge Overton's office to the city hall and that proved inadequate to accommodate the crowd, many being unable to gain admittance. Witnesses for the state were Parley Morgan, state traffic officer, a Mr. Libby and the Mt. Angel police. Shafer's only witness was Norvin Strange who was riding with him when arrested.

Schafer is also charged with unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor but the time for his trial on this charge has not been set.

J. J. Suss was brought before Judge Overton Tuesday on a charge of driving an automobile on the public highway with four persons over the age of 12 years in the driver's seat. He entered a plea of guilty and was fined \$250 and costs which he paid.

The trial of Francis Krebs, which was to have been held Tuesday, was again postponed on account of the absence of necessary witnesses. He was arrested July 4 for driving while intoxicated and this is the third time his trial has been postponed.

COMPLAINTS FILED IN CIRCUIT COURT

Dallas—Two complaints were filed in the clerk's office here Tuesday. The First National Bank of Independence is suing L. R. Hill in the first. The plaintiff asks a judgment for \$2200 with \$308 interest to August 18, 1932 and at 8 per cent from that date until paid, \$150 attorneys' fees and costs and disbursements of the action. The plaintiff also seeks a judgment for \$2000 with \$250 interest to August 18, 1932 and at 8 per cent from that date until paid, \$163.07 taxes and interest at 8 per cent for August 22, 1932, \$125 attorneys' fees and costs and disbursements. They also ask the foreclosure of the mortgages the defendants offered as security and the sale of the lands involved to satisfy their claims. They ask that a deficiency judgment be given in case the sale of these lands fail to satisfy the judgment costs, attorneys' fees, and costs and disbursements of the actions.

In the second action the Eena company is suing Jas. A. French and Mrs. Jas. A. French. They ask a judgment against each of the defendants for \$250 with 8 per cent interest from January 1, 1925, \$50 for attorneys' fees, and costs and disbursements for the action.

SMITH HUGHES' PROJECTS KEEP STUDENTS BUSY

Silverton—What is summer vacation to most high school students is a heavy continuance of school projects for the Smith-Hughes department attendant. There has been no lack of employment for the Silverton vocational agricultural students during the three summer months and 25 per cent of the projects must be carried on through the summer on either their own initiative or on shares. These projects comprise a raising of crop or livestock and are largely on a self-ownership basis.

Immediate school plans have been outlined by Warren E. Crabtree, local instructor, and include preparation of animals for showing at the Clackamas county and Oregon state fairs.

Palmer Torvond heads the list with his purbred cattle, swine and sheep. Others owning purbred livestock which will be exhibited at the fairs are Herbert Jones, president of the F. F. A. club; Sam Wilson, Clifton Strom, Paul Purvis, Elmer Thompson and Sanford Davis.

Another definite plan is studying the practice of stock judging in the context in preparation for the fall fairs. These plans have already been started and will terminate at the Pacific International Livestock exposition at Portland. A further plan for Silverton vocational agricultural students is active help in formation of a farm shop and mechanics booth at the state fair.

Courses offered in the Smith-Hughes department include farm animals course with its related farm shopwork for freshmen; soils and crops with advanced farm shop and mechanics work for sophomores, and rural engineering included in the third and fourth year courses. The department also offers a part time night class for boys out of school and night classes for adults in poultry production. This is the fourth year adult night poultry classes have been in practice. Last year a course in dairying for adults was held. A part time class is also held in farm shop and mechanics for boys who cannot attend school.

Adult education in the last few years has become an important feature of the department activities, being made possible under the cooperation of the state and federal boards of vocational education under the national Smith-Hughes act of congress in 1917.

Oregon Surveyor General Of Territorial Days Was Early Friend Of Lincoln

Lafayette—A stone slab bearing the carved initials A. G. H. and the date 1856, was found while removing the foundation of an old building on the farm of Dr. W. L. Bishop.

Dr. Anson G. Henry, who left this brief record, came across the plains in the early '50s. He was once the owner of this scenic farm situated on a lofty hill with the surrounding territory for many miles in view. On this site Indians lighted their signal fires.

Dr. Henry was surveyor general of the territory. He was a personal friend of Abraham Lincoln and his family. Previous to the assassination in 1865, Lincoln conferred with Dr. Henry with regard to securing

FOREST BLAZE THREATENS AT DAVIS ESTATE

Turner—Fire of undetermined origin breaking out in three places on the Turner-Davis estate half west of town for three days, being first discovered Saturday. A number of men from Turner kept watch and made efforts to check the blaze but Sunday evening the fire broke away from the fire-fighting force who by this time were weary from a day and night on the mountain.

An urgent call for more help was relayed to Turner and 11 men from the Southern Pacific steel gang now in Turner responded. Under the supervision of the foreman, Angel Chavis, who has had some experience previously in fighting big fires, 10 men with shovels lost no time in clearing out a fire trail about three feet wide and nearly a mile long and with back-firing soon had the fire under control. Without their efforts it is thought the home of at least one farmer in the Baker Creek district would have been destroyed. Others were in the path of the flames but at a greater distance.

Eighty cords of fir wood belonging to A. E. Robertson of Turner were threatened but at last report they had succeeded in keeping the fire away. Nine cords of wood belonging to Baker brothers were destroyed. Only nominal damage has been done as the fire has been mostly confined to logged-off land and underbrush. About a section of land has been burned over already and the fire is still smoldering. No new damage is expected. A considerable number have viewed the fire as it is rather unusual to get a close-up view of a forest fire of this size.
