

DISPLAY BOOTH AT FAIR HOLDS MUCH INTEREST

Auburn—The annual meeting of the executive committee of Haystack Sunday school district, will be held at the home of Charles W. Cary, the display and publicity secretary of the district, who has charge of the display booth at the state fair. The purpose of the meeting is to discuss plans for the display work to be entered this fall, and to appoint committees to care for the booth during the fair. All Sunday schools of all denominations throughout the state are invited to send display work. The executive committee, consisting of pastors, Sunday school superintendents and display secretaries of the various Sunday schools are requested to be present, and delegates from Sunday schools throughout the state are invited also to be present.

Over 5000 visitors entered the booth last year. Representatives of almost every state in the union, and several registered from foreign countries. From direct correspondence with state fairs and expositions it has been learned that while several conduct similar booths, the one at the Oregon state fair which is sponsored by the Haystack Sunday school district, is outstanding in that it is the only one displaying only work made by Sunday school pupils and classes, and is conducted by Sunday school members; and where all denominations work together. The display booth is located in the northeast section of the grand stand exhibit building, the same location as last year.

Pioneer Munkers Family Among Early Settlers Of District Holds Reunion

Scio—Eighty-six years ago Benjamin Munkers and his wife arrived from Missouri with ox teams, stopping at the present site of Salem, capital of the then vast expanse of "Oregon Country."

Last Sunday the annual reunion of the Munkers clan was held on the spot where these pioneers ended their long trail in October, 1846. About 50 persons attended the gathering, including Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Erving and Mr. and Mrs. Riley Shelton, who were born in Oregon and have spent more than three score years here.

"What do you want for this place, stranger?" Munkers inquired of the owner of the primitive cabin which occupied his claim. This was in the fall of 1846 and winter was approaching.

"I'll take a thousand dollars," the stranger retorted.

"Well, you've sold it," Munkers quickly decided.

Mrs. Munkers was ill and all members of the party were weary and worn from the six months' trek across the parched plains that lay between Oregon and Missouri.

"It was no trick for Munkers to produce the thousand dollars," Riley Shelton said in Scio after returning from Sunday's gathering. "He flashed the cash as soon as he could get into the covered wagon and return to the cabin," Shelton added. "And he had nine thousand dollars in gold left in that wagon."

Not all immigrants left their homes east of the Missouri with ten thousand dollars in gold cached in a box under the bedding, but that was the good fortune of Ben Munkers in 1846, according to descendants of this sturdy pioneer.

Hager's grove, near Salem, is the mecca for the annual meeting of Munkers people. T. J. (Tom) Munkers of Portland, former resident and banker of Scio, is a grandson of the original locator of the donation land claim on which the grove is situated. The man to whom Ben Munkers paid the gold for the privilege of getting his sick wife and the children under shelter for the first winter in Oregon, moved only a short distance and acquired another tract of land.

The ox train with which the Munkers family crossed the plains was composed of about 100 families. At times it was necessary to divide the train into smaller units in order to secure grazing sustenance for the work cattle, it is recalled. Many members of the memorable trek remained in Oregon and prospered, while others were attracted to the gold rush in California, where they did likewise or otherwise.
