

WATER METERS READ TOO HIGH AT SILVERTON

Silverton—Much dissatisfaction concerning the rates for use of water in the city limits and also as regards charges for water in the outer sections where the owners have paid for the installation of their meters, has led to an organization, sponsored largely by the local L. A. group, with H. Scott selected as permanent chairman and F. E. Sylvester as secretary.

The first mass meeting will be held Tuesday evening at the 4-L hall with an urgent request that all users of water who desire other rates, attend. The principal object of Tuesday's session is to obtain the opinion of the users as to the selection of the members of the commission. At present those in authority as to management of affairs are there by appointment, and it is reported that many citizens want to help place these members by right of vote, and the called meeting is to determine the prospects of a change.

A few weeks ago 715 residents signed a petition protesting a change in rates by the board in an attempt to equalize the charges, with the result that the users were put back on the old rates after a conference between the water board and a specially appointed committee, consisting of P. L. Brown and R. B. Duncan, that was selected by Mayor L. C. Eastman at a recent meeting of the city council when the petitions were brought to the council session. The users were asked to pay an old rate charge of the July account, on the August bill, which apparently made the rates higher than ever, and much feeling has been evidenced both for and against the action of the board.

Tuesday's meeting will give opportunity for a verbal expression, and positive statements as to the desire of the people as to who shall be in charge of the Silverton water affairs.

NEW CREAMERY BEING RUSHED TO COMPLETION

Sheridan—The new Sheridan Co-operative creamery is being pushed rapidly and it is expected to be ready for business in two or three weeks time, according to those in charge of the work.

Several shipments of the new machinery have already been received and are being installed. The boiler and piping has been installed. The cream churn has a capacity of 1,000 pounds and the butter churn has a similar capacity. The building which was last used by N. McIntyre as a garage and accessory building is 60 by 120 feet. The first 60 feet, which has been given a new cement floor, will be used as the butter room and separated from the rear 60 feet by a partition. The rear part of the building, which will be the cheese plant, will not be finished until spring or until cheese prices warrant, although the equipment has already been purchased.

The butter room is ready for the carpenter work and is in charge of Ed McKibbin of Ballston, who is one of the directors.

Paul Jones, manager for the new business, is already in the city. The butter maker, Walter Paeschke, is also here. Both Jones and Paeschke are from Eugene and experts in their line.

Local labor has been used in every instance where possible and although much work is yet necessary before completion, both on the inside and outside, the wheels will soon be running.

The present Sheridan creamery, owned and operated by Edwin J. Bayless for a number of years, is still doing a thriving business. Many predict that the community can not support two creamery establishments, but those having a knowledge of the personnel of those patronizing the present business have expressed themselves as confident of but little competition. Those who will sell to the cooperative are farmers who ship to other dispensaries in main and the old business will feel little pressure.

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CANNERY RUNS DOUBLE SHIFT

Woodburn—After several weeks of quietness the hum of machinery is once more heard at the Ray-Brown cannery where the large plant has been operating at capacity since Thursday on pears. Two shifts of 250 women each are employed daily, each shift working 10 hours. A total of more than 800 people are on the pay roll.

Pears are being shipped in from the Rogue river valley, Grants Pass and the Yakima valley and unloaded at the ripening sheds. An average of 10 carloads a day are being handled and packed, and with the new machinery recently installed the plant has a capacity of 10 tons an hour. In addition to the enormous amount of pears handled the plant is also running blackberries.

A visit to this busy place impresses one with the extreme cleanliness of the entire plant, the orderly system maintained and the neat appearance of women in charge of blue and white uniforms and caps.

The plant will operate continuously until the end of the pear season which is ordinarily from 50 to 60 days and the total pear pack is expected to be not less than 600 cars.

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
