

# PORTLAND TAKES SACRAMENTO SERIES, 3 OUT OF 4

## BEAVERS SPLIT SUNDAY GAMES WITH SENATORS

Portland took the series from Sacramento, three games out of four, by splitting the doubleheader Sunday. The Ducks took the opener, 5 to 0, as Bowman held the Reds to six scattered hits. The Senators had good pitching by Kenzo Nishida, the Japanese midget, and Jimmy De Shong, to win the closing contest, 8 to 2. They allowed eight hits between them, while Sacramento batters got 14 off McDonald and Jacobs. Portland finished the week still leading the league, and with 10 victories in the last 14 starts.

San Francisco's Seals won three of the four games played during the week-end with Hollywood, landing in second place by the narrow margin of one percentage point over Los Angeles. The Seals were crowded down to fourth place, one game behind Los Angeles.

The Stars took the opener of the Sunday doubleheader behind the 4-hit pitching of Emil Yde. The Seals' only chance to score came in the fourth inning when they filled the bases with one out. But Yde asserted his supremacy by striking out the next batter, and a forced outfielder the side. The second game was billed for seven innings, but at the end of the seventh neither team had scored. Hollywood talked once in the eighth,

and the Seals came back with two runs to take the game and series.

Los Angeles made a clean sweep of the series with the Missions by taking both ends of the Sunday double bill, 12 to 1, and 4 to 3. In the opener Win Ballou held the Reds to seven hits while his mates fell on two Mission hurriers for 18 safeties. The second game was tied at 3-all at the end of the seventh, when it was due to finish. It went on until the ninth, when Outfielder Homer Summa singled with the bases full for the winning run.

Oakland's Sunday double header at Seattle was rained out, the Indians taking the series, two games to none.

## Yankees Need 18 More Wins to Annex Pennant; Chicago Cubs Seek 22

If you're interested in mathematical possibilities, the New York Yankees can clinch the American league flag with 18 more victories while the Chicago Cubs need 22 to assure themselves of the National league pennant.

The Yankees, by winning 18 of their remaining games, can clinch the pennant regardless of what Philadelphia accomplishes. Washington is in an even more dangerous position for the senators automatically will be eliminated as soon as the Yankees win 13 games.

In the National league Pittsburgh could win all of its remaining games and still finish no better than second if the Cubs can take 22 decisions. Brooklyn will be eliminated as soon as the Cubs win 20 games. It might be remembered too that each time their closest

rivals are beaten the Cubs and Yankees will need one fewer victory to clinch.

The Cubs continued their mad dash through the older circuit yesterday, losing yet the New York Giants, 5-4, for their tenth successive triumph. Kiki Cuyler drove in four runs with a single, home run and long fly, the latter knocking home the winning marker in the ninth. Brooklyn's hopes took a sharp drop as the Dodgers took two decisions to the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-1, and 6-4. Dizzy Dean won his third game in five days in the nightcap although he was relieved by Sylvester Johnson in the ninth.

Cincinnati and Philadelphia split two well-pitched games, the opened going to the Phillies, 2-1, and the second struggle to the Reds, 2-2.

The Yankees maintained their 10th game lead in the American circuit by splitting two games with the Chicago White Sox. The Sox won the first game, 5-2, as Ted Lyons held the Yankees to five hits, but dropped the second, 11-5, when New York collected six hits. Babe Ruth hit a homer in each game to bring his season's total to 39.

Cleveland scored seven runs in the first inning to win the first game from the Boston Red Sox, 10-1, but dropped the second, 4-3, when Benny Tate clouted a homer in the 11th inning. Detroit pounded Weaver, Brown and Coffman for 21 hits and won a 15-7 victory over Washington.

## "PEPPER" MARTIN SHIFTED TO THIRD

St. Louis, Aug. 29 (AP)—"Pepper" Martin, whose sensational batting in the world series last fall won him fame overnight, may be moved in closer to the spectators.

Gabby Street, manager of the St. Louis Cardinals, shifted Martin from center field to third base yesterday in a series of "experiments" designed to strengthen the world champions' defense. Play, Spary Adams, suffering from an injured knee, recently voluntarily retired for the season, creating the big problem of filling his place at third.

Martin had little chance to show his fitness for third base in the doubleheader against the Brooklyn Dodgers yesterday, getting only two chances—one when he caught a line drive and the other when he accepted a throw to retire a runner at third.

## CENTER OF LINE CHIEF WORRY OF PAUL SCHISSLER

Oregon State College, Corvallis, Aug. 29.—Development of a new line from tackle to tackle will be one of the major tasks confronting the Oregon State college coaching staff when the Orange football players report here for the opening practice September 10. Of the 11 lettermen lost to the squad last season eight are linemen and five of these eight were regulars. These losses leave five positions in the forward wall wide open for competition among some 24 candidates.

The center and guard positions were his hardest by graduation. Only one letterman, Loren Tuttle of Grants Pass, a right guard, is available. Probably the biggest loss in the line is at center, where Buck Hammer will be missed. So serious is the situation here that Vic Curtin, who made his letter at right end last season, was switched to center during spring practice. Willie Danford of Bend, a varsity reserve, has some experience and should be in the running with Curtin.

Bill Kenna of Minneapolis, a varsity reserve, is outstanding among other candidates who will battle with Tuttle for the right guard position made vacant by the loss of Jack Cox.

Herman Leaf of Los Angeles, who won his letter at left end last season, has been switched to left guard to help plug the gap left by the graduation of Gil Bergerson. Tommy Miles of Honolulu and Hugh Stanford of Baker, both varsity reserves last year, should see plenty of action at left guard this year.

Although Bill Byington is lost at right tackle two more lettermen, Tar Schwammel of Oakland, Cal., and Wayne Harn of Pontiac, Cal., are expected back. John King of Cottage Grove, a reserve, and Swede Stevenson of Minneapolis, a member of the freshman team last year, are among the other likely candidates.

Curly Miller of The Dalles, a two-year letterman, will be back to take the place of Harry Kent at left tackle. Another outstanding bidder for this position is Harry Field, a transfer from University of Hawaii.

With all five line positions in doubt some lively battles and upsets are expected in the opening days of practice.

Hiddleweight grapplers will be featured on Tuesday night's wrestling show at the armory when Chet Wiles of Portland, and Bob Myers of Tillamook clash in the two hour event. Wiles, big city policeman while not of the "circuit riding" type of grappler, nevertheless has plenty of experience and should give his opponent plenty of opposition.

## SEWS UP HEART AFTER OPERATION

Vienna, Aug. 29 (AP)—Rudolf Dalmaler, an 11 year old boy whose heart was pierced by three bird shot in a hunting accident on Sunday, today was reported recovering after a remarkable surgical feat by Dr. Gustav Feilerich of the University of Vienna.

The surgeon sewed up the three wounds in the still beating heart and later removed shot organs. The entire operation was carried out with the utmost speed and a fatal hemorrhage forestalled.

## TWO AUTO RACERS KILLED IN CRASH

Woodbridge, N. J., Aug. 29 (AP)—A collision in the second five-mile qualifying heat of the season's first racing program at Woodbridge speedway cost Francis Farmer, nationally known automobile racer, and Bill Neapolitan, of Philadelphia, their lives yesterday.

The accident occurred as Farmer tried to pass Neapolitan on a bank. Neapolitan's car turned over and his chest was crushed. Farmer suffered a compound fracture of the skull. The feature event was won by Bryan Saulspough, of Philadelphia, who covered the 25 miles in 26 minutes, 4 seconds.

Port Austin, Mich. (AP)—A society has been organized here to fight for the preservation of an old brick chimney, a landmark at Port Crescent. The chimney, sole remnant of a vanished building, is 100 feet high. Port Crescent, a village of 600 population in 1870, was abandoned in 1890.

## CHESS CHAMPION KEEPS HIS CROWN

Pasadena, Cal., Aug. 29 (AP)—Dr. Alexander Alekhine, Parisian lawyer, retained the world's chess championship today after proving his superiority in international competition, but losing his first game in two years to a Portland, Ore., expert.

Arthur Dake was the only man to beat Dr. Alekhine in a game of the tournament or elsewhere during the last two years. His victory came Saturday night as the tournament neared its close.

The Parisian's match last night ended in a draw, but he had clinched his title in the ninth round. Reuben Fine, New York, held the champion even in 57 moves.

Irving Kashdan, New York, was second in the tourney and won a \$150 prize. Dr. Alekhine's victory netted him \$250.

## NEBRASKA WOMEN KEEP COST BOOKS

Lincoln, Neb. (AP)—Five hundred Nebraska women are keeping books this year to determine just what it costs to operate a home.

## GRIMM MAKES BALL HISTORY

Chicago, Aug. 29 (AP)—Charles John Grimm, manager of the Chicago Cubs for the past 27 days, today seemed likely to become the first manager in major league annals to take over a team in August and pilot it to a pennant.

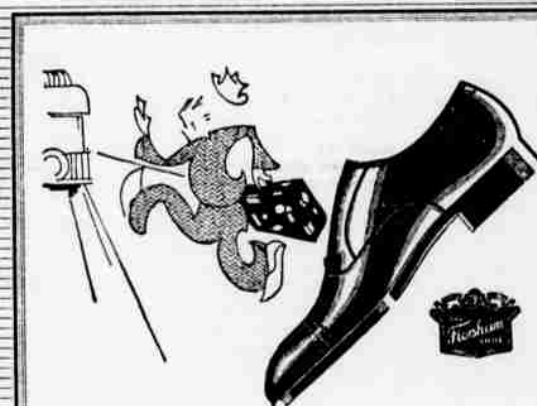
When Grimm was elevated to the helm after Rogers Hornsby's dismissal at Philadelphia August 2, the Cubs were in second place, five games behind Pittsburgh and eight and one-half games above the third place Brooklyn Robins.

The Cubs' relentless drive has won for them 20 out of 25 games under Grimm, including 13 out of 14 in the present stay at Wrigley field. They have intact a winning streak of 10 straight—longest of the National league season.

Grimm himself has no illusions about his part in the Cubs' reversal of form.

"I am letting the team manage itself," said Grimm. "No one can run a ball club. It's the players that make the team. The Cubs know how to play ball, and what to do without me telling them. Occasionally some one has to make a decision in close games. But as much as possible I let each player use his own initiative."
