

RATE ADJUSTERS SEEKING ACTION FOR SILVERTON

Silverton—The mass meeting to consider questions concerning water rates and appointment of members of the water commission was called Monday evening instead of Tuesday, as the group at first decided at the time they met for organization. The 4-1/2s are active in the work of readjusting rates and in making an effort to give the people a say as to the personnel of the water commission. R. Scott is permanent chairman and P. E. Sylvester is secretary of the group, which convened in the 4-L hall.

At the previous meeting, Dr. A. J. McCannel was asked to head a committee to arrange an amendment to the city charter section No. 104, whereby the members of the commission may be voted upon at the regular elections. This was reported on that section referred to gave the power to the mayor to appoint three legal voters to serve on the water commission for a period of six years. Discussions were favored presenting the city recorder a petition for the consideration of the city council at the next regular meeting in which the desires of the group were made known. The petition was read and included a desire to secure the rights of the people to place names for the commission on the regular ballot, to designate the term of office as two years, and to require the members of the water commission to publish in the papers each month a record of expenditures and receipts. The custom was reported of placing before the city council semi-annually the financial report of the receipts and disbursements of the water commission, and the group felt that this should be given to the general public monthly.

Also at the previous session, a legislative committee was appointed, consisting of Gus Herr, E. P. McNeer and D. Giesler, whose duty it was to seek some representative of the organization to appear on the ballot as mayor and at least three men to run for the position of city councilmen. McNeer reported that the present nominee, E. Garver, was the choice of the committee, and that the committee members had not had time to select the men to appear as council aspirants.

The president appointed E. P. McNeer, E. C. Sylvester and Lloyd Moser as circulation committee to chart the town and appoint men to present the petition for signatures, and this is to be presented to the city council at the next meeting by this committee.

BROWNSVILLE BANK FACES COURT ACTION

Albany—A claim for \$21,700 alleged due the loan agency of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation by the Bank of Brownsville at the time it closed its doors last May, was filed in circuit court Monday by W. O. Shelton, manager of the agency.

The claim of the finance corporation is evidenced by notes, which are as follows: A balance of \$7,255.21 of a \$25,000 note due September, 1932; and notes for \$12,847.70, \$1100 and \$500.00. As security the Bank of Brownsville furnished notes owed to it by patrons in the amount of \$32,356.01.

COLLEGE WORK NOW OFFERED; DATE CHANGED

Albany—Plans have been completed for the establishment of an extension of the Mt. Angel Junior college at the Mt. Angel academy to allow students of the latter institution to take two years of college work. The extension will be in operation this year, it was announced, following the arrival of the Rev. Father Elton Heibel, O.S.B., from the east this week. Father Alcuin, who has been attending the summer session of the Catholic university at Washington, D. C., is rector of both the Mt. Angel college and the Mt. Angel academy and normal.

At the same time it was announced that the opening date for the high school department at the academy has been postponed from September 6 to 12. The normal and junior college extension will open September 19. Credits received from the junior college will be recognized by the northwest bureau of standardization.

The faculty will include Father Alcuin Heibel, O.S.B.M.A., rector, assisted by the Rev. Father Vincent Koppert, O.S.B., Ph.D. Several sisters holding degrees from the University of Oregon, will likewise be on the faculty. Father Vincent in explaining the new extension, said some of the general college courses which will be offered for the girls include sociology, history, English, comparative religion, psychology, biology, chemistry and modern languages. Plans also are under way for the establishment of courses in pre-nursing.

Establishment of the junior college extension in no way affects the two-year normal school or other departments, merely giving the girls a chance to get two years of their college work in Mt. Angel, just as the boys are able to do.

The Mt. Angel college will open with registration September 14 and classes will start September 15. By adding an additional round-trip schedule between Mt. Angel and Woodburn on school days, the Oregon Stages company has adjusted their service to accommodate academy and college students. This schedule will become effective September 12 and is as follows: But will leave Silverton 7:50 a.m. and arrive at Mt. Angel at 8:06. Leave Woodburn Junction at 9:37 a.m. and arrive at Mt. Angel at 8:55. North-bound evening schedule: Leave Mt. Angel at 4:10 p.m., arrive Woodburn bound evening schedule: Leave Mt. Angel 4:49 p.m., arrive Silverton 5:03. Special students' tickets in books of 40 rides are available to Mt. Angel and from the above named places.
