

PLAYERS TUNE UP FOR 2 BIG GOLF TOURNAMENTS

AMERICAN TEAM IN WALKER PLAY HIT BY ILLNESS

Brookline, Mass., Aug. 30 (AP)—Golf balls whizzed over the Country Club course today as American and British Walker cup teams began final preparations for their matches Thursday and Friday.

Captain Francis Ouimet, just out of a sickbed, was still in a weakened condition but was hoping to be in sufficient condition to lead the Americans.

Another American team member who was hoping to overcome the injury jinx was "Jimmy" Johnston of St. Paul. He twisted an ankle invading the tennis field but said he would play Thursday.

Neither Captain Tony Torrance of the British team nor Ouimet was prepared to announce team selections until time for the play to begin Thursday. Ouimet appeared to have at least five of the American starters chosen. They were himself, George Voigt, Gus Moreland, Jess Sweetser and Charlie Seaver. He has three more choices to make.

Torrance has a bit harder time as three of his team have been none too impressive since they came to these shores. John Bookless, representing Scottish golf, Eric Fiddian, runner-up in the British championship play, and Leonard Crawley, English champion of 1931, have yet to hit their best stride. From all appearances it seemed as if Torrance would name himself, John Burke, Rex Hartley, John DeForest, Bill Stout, Eric McRorie and Lester Hartley. DeForest is the British champion.

BURLEY GRIMES PREPARES FOR BALL CLASSIC

New York, Aug. 30 (AP)—A little more than a month now, and the Yankees and the Cubs will be mixing it up in another of what the boys and girls like to call the annual fall classic. And who do you suppose, aside from M. Ruth of course, will be the three-star personality of the proceedings?

You guessed it right the first time pals—that of man of baseball himself, Burleigh Arland Grimes. If Burleigh was a man of his word, he'd be a-sittin' out on a farm in Indiana or Kentucky instead of laying in a store of slippery elm and rubbing the old firing piece in preparation for another world series. For 1929, when he was with the Pittsburgh Pirates:

"Please tell the fans for me," Grimes said, "that I have no idea of continuing in baseball after 1930. I have no ambition to run a marathon with old man time. I want to have a good year in 1930 and then hang up my glove for good. This will be my last season, regardless. I have saved my money, am fixed for the future and in 1931 will buy a farm in Indiana or Kentucky and raise horses and cattle."

Burleigh raised things all right, but it wasn't horses and cattle. He raised calm with the Athletics and in the 1930 series, when he lost two tremendously fought games, and raised the devil with the same club last year when he whipped them twice to give the Cards the championship and shatter old Mack's dream of three world titles in a row.

If the Cubs reach the world series, and it doesn't seem as if anything short of a pestilence is going to stop them—Grimes is likely to be the key man of Grimes's pitching staff. Rated strictly on this year's records, Burleigh, who has won but five or six games doesn't look like the key man of anything, illness and injuries have kept him out of action a greater part of the season and Burleigh, a rugged soul despite his years, has to work to keep in shape.

Right now Burleigh is in shape, as his five-hit performance against the Giants last week testified. And he's liable to stay that way, too.

Having gotten wind, perhaps, of the rumor that their manager is in active danger of losing his job at the close of the current race, the Washington Senators have started a belated drive that promises to do Walter Johnson a lot of good.

In winning 11 of their last 14 games, the Senators at least have gained a rehearsing for the "big train," and if they sustain that clip up to the last day it is doubtful that owner Clark Griffith would give further thought to a change of ups.

Picked to finish at or near the top, they barely were clinging to the first division a fortnight ago. By defeating the St. Louis Browns yesterday, 7 to 6, in 13 innings while Philadelphia was dividing a doubleheader with Detroit, the Senators climbed within five and a half games of second place. If they catch the A's and land the runner-up berth, Johnson will need to make no apologies when contract time rolls around.

Singles by West and Kerr and Maple's long fly gave the Senators the winning run in yesterday's long contest, their second 13 inning victory within a week. Walt Stewart went the route for the Browns while three moundmen worked for the winners with Bill McAfee eventually receiving credit for the triumph.

The Yankees stepped a little further ahead of the field by trimming Chicago twice, 10 to 3 and 4 to 3. Lefty Gomez breezed to his 22nd victory in the first game, but Charley Ruffing had a close scrape before chalking up No. 16 in the nightcap. Red Kress' homer with one in the eighth came within a run of tying the count.

MANY STARS OF GOLFDOM ENTER PROS' MARATHON

St. Paul, Aug. 30 (AP)—Golf's longest marathon, the annual Professional Golfers' association championship, moved into its first lap today with 103 of America's stars struggling to win 31 holes that stretch toward the throne room.

Only one pro had his place won and that was the defending champion, Tom Creavy of Albany, N. Y., an automatic qualifier. All the others, among them far more famed marksmen of golf, were confronted with a 36-hole qualifying test that 72 had to lose.

Except for Gene Sarazen and Leo Diegel who failed to qualify in the metropolitan test, virtually every professional of note was in the big drive over the Keller course and one guess as to the ultimate winner in the 216 holes, six-day championship battle, was as good as another.

Creavy as champion ranked among the favorites but was somewhat overshadowed by such veterans as "Light Horse" Harry Cooper of Chicago, Canadian open champion and winner of the \$10,000 St. Paul open over the same Keller layout in 1930; Walter Hagen of Detroit, five times champion of the P.G.A. event and so determined to add another that he came on the scene a day ahead of time for practice; Tommy Armour of Detroit, master iron shot-maker; Billy Burke of Greenwich, Conn., 1931 national open champion, and a host of others including Horton Smith, winner of the St. Paul open last year; Denny Shute, runner-up to Creavy in the championship in 1930; and Johnny Farrell, Paul Runyan, Joe Golden, Olin Dutra, Ed Dudley, Al Watrous and Joe Turnesa.

The championship Keller course was a different looking layout today than it was when almost the same field toured it during the St. Paul opens of 1930 and 1931. Its fairways were lined with 32 new traps while

New York Yanks Get First Games Of World Series

New York, Aug. 30 (AP)—If the New York Yankees and Chicago Cubs meet in the 1932 world series, the first two games will be played in Yankee Stadium, New York, beginning about Sept. 28.

The next three games will be played at Chicago, and necessary to determine the winner of four out of seven possible games, they will be in New York.

The major league season closed Sept. 25, and it is the custom to open the world series two or three days afterward.

Yankees Establish No Shut-Out Mark

New York, Aug. 30 (AP)—The New York Yankees, rolling merrily along toward the American league pennant, have set a new modern record by playing 129 games without being shut out once.

The second game of yesterday's double-header with the Chicago White Sox rounded out 129 encounters this year, including the protested game with Detroit.

This record surpassed the record of the great 1927 Yankee team under the late Miller Huggins, which was shut out in its 129th game.

CRUCIAL SERIES COMING UP IN PACIFIC BALL

With five weeks remaining of the Coast league season, managers and fans are scanning the schedule in figuring what competition the four leading teams will have to face in the final rush for the wire.

Portland, leading by four games, plays the tail-end Missions in San Francisco this week, then takes on Hollywood, San Francisco and Los Angeles, three first division teams. If the Ducks are still ahead after these engagements, they should have easy sailing, as they close against Seattle.

The Seals, in second place by one percentage point over Los Angeles, have a good chance to win the pennant, declares Manager Jimmy Caveney. He pointed out the team was farther behind at this time last year and came through to win the second half of the split season and go on to trim Hollywood in the play-off for the championship. This week San Francisco goes to Sacramento, then comes home to take on Seattle. Two weeks in the north follow to play Portland and Seattle, and the last week the Seals play the Missions at home.

Hollywood, fourth in the pennant race, plays at Oakland this week, followed by series against Portland, Sacramento, Oakland and Los Angeles.

This week the Angels meet Seattle then go to Sacramento for a series, Seattle and Portland follow, and the season ends with a home engagement against Hollywood.

The Portland-Mission series with the Hollywood-Oakland games beginning Tuesday, will be played afternoons, other engagements being night affairs.
