

YANKEES ON THRESHOLD OF WINNING LEAGUE FLAG

ATHLETICS AND SENATORS KEEP PACE IN RACE

The opposition willing, today promised to bring the end of the long, dusty trail Manager Joe McCarthy and his Yankees have trod on the way to pennantville.

A victory over the Cleveland Indians today and the Yanks are "in."
Or, failing that, the Ruppert Rifics can lose and still sew up the American league flag, providing the Athletics and Senators also are taken for a couple of falls.

The Yanks assured themselves at least a tie by yesterday's 12 inning triumph over Cleveland, 8 to 3. They scored five times after two were out in the last inning.

Washington scored its ninth consecutive victory, defeating Chicago, 9 to 3, with Alvin Crowder pitching.

Lefty Grove was in fine fettle and the Athletics thumped Detroit, 7 to 1. It was his 23rd victory.

The Brooklyn Dodgers gave no aid and comfort to the Cubs' cause in the National league when they beat the leaders, 4 to 3. The setback reduced Chicago's lead to five games over the Pittsburgh Pirates, who were trimming the Phillies, 4 to 2, in the league's only other engagement.

A triple from the bat of Ben Chapman and a home run by Bill Dickey were the deciding blows in the 12 inning Cleveland-Yankee game. Chapman's hit clearing loaded bases and Dickey's round trip bloop sending Ben home ahead of him for the five runs that sank the Indians.

If the Yankees do close the books today their manager will become the first man to pilot a pennant winner in each major league. His previous success was with the Chicago Cubs, whom he now stands a good chance of meeting in the world series.

The Cubs' downfall may be laid to Johnny Evers, who retired from strenuous competition this year to sit on the bench and every now and then hit a home run when Manager Max Carey asked him to. It was the last half of the ninth. Glenn Wright was on base, the Cubs were a run ahead, so he smacked one of Burleigh Grimes' offerings against the right field screen to settle the argument.

Paul Waner's home run in the first inning with his brother, Lloyd, on base, helped the Pirates make a clean sweep of their three game series with the Phillies.

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FISCHER LEADS QUALIFIERS IN AMATEUR MEET

Baltimore Country Club, Md., Sept. 13 (AP)—Today's hero of the U. S. amateur golf championship was long, lean Johnny Fischer, of Port Thomas, Kentucky.

This gentleman who holds the American intercollegiate championship set out with 150 others to complete the qualifying rounds of the 1932 national tournament. His score of 69 for the first qualification round was just three strokes better than those of his nearest rivals, and only a golfing miracle in reverse could keep him from rating a place in black Wednesday's "sudden death" man-to-man links combat.

Today's second and qualification round found many of the pre-tournament favorites already on the outside looking in at the boys who will rate places in the match play. Francis Ouimet of Brookline, Mass., defending champion, could do no better than 78 in his first tour.

Others of Ouimet's "border line" class included Tony Torrance of England, with 80; Eric McRivie, who like Torrance was a member of British Walker Cup team with 79; John de Forest, British amateur champion, 78; Don Moe, Portland, 80; Rex Hartley, England, 81.

Along with Fischer, the leaders as the second qualification round started today were Jack Westland of Chicago, 71, and Charley Yates, Georgia Tech sophomore; Johnny Goodman, of Omaha; George Voigt, of Lancaster, Pa., each of whom had a 72.

Chandler Egan, of Medford, Ore., became one of the sentimental favorites by scoring a 73 in his first test. Egan won the title in 1904 and repeated in 1905.

Today's play will be made up of the second qualifying round of 18 holes.

Tonorrow two rounds of match play at 18 holes will reduce the 32 qualifiers to a final of eight which will begin 36-hole match rounds on Thursday.

Meriden, Conn. (AP)—"Big Ed" Walsh, who once smoked them over the plate for the Chicago White Sox, still sends the ball a-flying—but the tree has replaced the mound.

When the famous spitball hurler retired from baseball he turned for his livelihood to golf—his second love. He can be found any day now, holding down his first job as a professional at the Meriden Municipal golf course.

Walsh, looking only 35 of his 51 years, started playing golf in 1916, learning the five points of the game from such notable exponents as Walter Hagen, Chick Evans and others famous in the realm of golf.

Walsh, who is concentrating on golf instruction, takes his job seriously.

"I have always liked teaching," he says, "because I have a great deal of patience. And being the coolest guy in the world myself, I never rattle the beginner."

In his tidy little workshop, Walsh is working on a new type club which he claims will add 15 to 20 yards to the drive. Always handy with carpenter tools, Walsh displayed with pride his lathe and other implements of the trade.

Next to baseball and golf Big Ed likes to hunt.

"In the fall I never miss a day. I have one real dog, a pointer, and we bag as many birds as the next one."

Pheasant, any style, is his favorite dish.

Besides teaching golf, Walsh has regular classes in baseball, specializing in pitchers and catchers. Between times he plays exhibition baseball, usually fanning four or five batters in a row before retiring to a fielding position for the balance of the contest.

VACATIONISTS CUT SNAKE POPULATION

Harrisburg, Pa. (AP)—The increase in the number of recreation seekers in Pennsylvania woods has resulted in a decrease in the number of poisonous snakes in the woods, according to forestry department reports.

The department credits the recreationists with killing many rattlesnakes and copperheads, the only venomous snakes found in the state.

Kills of 20 to 60 rattlers daily in the mountainous sections were not unusual 20 years ago. Today foresters who dispatch six snakes daily consider it a good day's work.



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
