PAROLE HEAD LAUDS SYSTEM

Oklahoma City (AP)—Rehabilitation of humanity by turning men out of prison is the plan of C. E. B. Cutler, Oklahoma's quiet and confident parole and parole attorney. Not many years ago, as history counts time, the galleys were the only method of reform. In recent years, man made the punishment fit the crime. Now he's being taught to make it fit the man.

Rehabilitation and reform replace punishment in Cutler's credo. And the man who has handled for Gov. W. H. (Alfalfa Bill) Murray what is considered a governor's most harassing task, has done it with a minimum of criticism, along lines laid down by Murray.

An unprecedented liberal system of probation has been inaugurated. Leases of absence, temporary paroles and paroles have been granted in greater numbers than ever before. Cutler believes that those who cry "coddling and sentimentalizing" every time anybody tries to do something for the criminal class are all wrong. He would do more.

He would give many of them a chance in society again without waiting until the end of a fixed sentence, with resentment in their souls against an unrelenting system.

Cutler believes "trial releases," where the prisoner is kept under close supervision and with the constant threat of return to prison hanging over him if he fails to do right, the most satisfactory solution to the ever-growing prison population.

GAME COMMISSION OUTLINES BUDGET

Portland, Sept. 13 (AP)—The Oregon state game commission today adopted a budget calling for the expenditure of \$735,000 during the fiscal year beginning October 1. Of the budget \$194,000 is apportioned to the executive division as follows: State police, \$132,500; supervisor's office, \$5,000; research, \$5,000; education, \$10,000; fishways and streams, \$14,000; bounties, \$10,000; and miscellaneous, \$5,500.

The division of fisheries is to be allowed \$134,000; the game division \$43,000; and the division of audit and records, \$13,500.

MAINE'S GOVERNOR HOPEFUL FOR HOOVER

Portland, Sept. 13 (AP)—Although "It looks like a political upheaval in Maine" to Governor William Tudor Gardner of that state he believes the state will be in the Hoover ranks in the November election. Governor Gardner arrived here today by airplane and found a telegram from Mrs. Gardner waiting for him. It told of the progress of the election.

"It looks like a political upheaval in Maine," the governor said. "I think the state will go overwhelmingly for Hoover in the November election, however. I believe the democratic victories are all due to local conditions."

Governor Gardner, a veteran of the World War, viewed the American Legion parade, today's feature of the national convention.

Small School Girl Attacked By Fiend

Medford, Ore., Sept. 13 (AP)—State police and the sheriff's office today sought a fiend, who late yesterday seized and assaulted a nine-year-old Phoenix school girl, as she was walking home from school down the railroad track. The assailant is described as a "bundle of sticks" and 45 years old and heavily bearded.

MEN WHO TAKE RUSSIAN WIVES HAVE TROUBLES

Moscow (AP)—At least 10 American engineers employed in the Soviet Union are engaged in a desperate and often tragic fight for permission to take their Russian wives home to the United States as their contracts here expire.

They find themselves blocked by official objections on the Soviet side and immigration regulations at the American end. The tragedy is emphasized in several instances by the fact that children have been born, or are soon expected by the Russian-American couples.

A number of the American husbands, unable to renew their visas after their contracts with the government ended, were obliged to depart, leaving their Russian families behind them. From places like Riga and Berlin they are continuing the struggle to obtain the release of their Russian wives.

Three American engineers formerly employed by the Colored Metals Trust here in Riga are now making frantic efforts to obtain passports for their Russian wives. They are George T. Gernall, Edmund C. Brown and P. L. Steinfeston.

Others are still in the Soviet Union but, knowing that these explanations of their contracts are near, already have begun the strenuous battle to retain their wives. Among these are C. C. Monette and L. H. Garau.

One of the Americans affected by this international marital tangle is Mr. Barrett, who has worked here many years and has two children by his Russian wife.

According to some of the American engineers the blame for the tragic situation does not rest entirely upon the Soviet officials. They point out that the refusal of the State Department to issue American passports or at least American visas gives the Soviet authorities reasonable grounds for refusing to grant exit visas to these Russian women. Under these Russian regulations the women are expected to relinquish Soviet citizenship before departing. Being unable to show proofs of any other citizenship, they are obviously unable to give up their Soviet status.

Garau, from North Canton, Ohio, has written and telegraphed to Senator Robert J. Bulkley of Ohio urging an amendment to the Cable Act of 1922 to meet the peculiar circumstances facing Americans in the Soviet Union. He asserts that a change in the formalities which would enable American citizen to apply for a visa for his foreign wife in her absence would help in many cases. At present the American rules call for a personal application by the wife, which is impossible for Russian women who must show an American visa to get permission to leave their country.

Other Americans have applied to Washington officials for assistance.

TOTS START BLAZE PERISH IN FLAMES

Pendleton, Ore., Sept. 13 (AP)—Lois Pierce, 8, and Gerald Thacker, 4, died today from suffocation and burns received late Monday when fire destroyed the W. E. Pierce home here.

The children were believed to have started the fire while playing with matches in the basement. The fire department was called as soon as the fire was discovered but the children were not immediately found because they had taken refuge under a bed in the basement.

Mrs. Pierce was in the house when the fire was discovered but was unable to find the children.

HISTORY OF WEST READ IN OLD CENTURY

Carson City, Nev. (AP)—Like a voice from the milderwest past of time, in many respects, is the Carson City cemetery.

For instance, close to the entrance and within the place stands an 8-foot quadrangular marble shaft, marking the last resting place of "Frances Pauline Doyle, consort of Captain W. H. Smith, died Nov. 11, 1904, aged 23 years." On the reverse side of the shaft appear the lines: Here lies a pilgrim of the world, With glory in her view; To heaven she lifts her longing eyes And bids the world adieu.

Inquiry among old-timers—there are none living contemporaneous to that date, 1866—failed to disclose any definite information of Captain Smith and his consort. It is presumed the captain was one of the army officers stationed at old Fort Churchill during the Indian war days, when the Pines and Washoes, then untamed, roamed this part of Nevada.

Not far distant from the shaft described is the grave of Hank Wook, famed stage-driver, whose admission to Horace Greeley to "keep your seat," that he would get him through on time, has been told and retold in thousands of stories written of the old west.

A plain upright marble slab marks the last resting place of the old driver and engraved on it is the inscription: "Hank Wook, February 28, 1866, aged 50."

At another place in the cemetery is the grave, marked by a square slab of marble, of "Jennie, only child of Orion and Mary E. Clements, Iowa, 1855, Nevada, 1884." (Jennie Clements), brother of Orion, who in Nevada's territorial days, was secretary to Governor Nye.

MARSHAL HALTS SLUMP BLAZES

Oklahoma City (AP)—A threatened epidemic of "depression fires" in Oklahoma has been checked by the state fire marshal's office, the semi-annual report of J. T. Jones, head of the department, says.

The first six months of 1932, Jones and his deputies investigated 210 "suspect" fires. Arrest of 49 persons suspected of arson resulted in seven convictions, two suicides following exposure and commitment of one pyromaniac to a state institution for the insane.

Jones blamed depressed economic conditions for the incendiary. Most cases were found to be efforts to collect insurance, he said.

In southeastern Oklahoma, a number of strange fires puzzled Jones. Non-insured buildings consumed, recurrence of three of the fires in the same location and absence of an apparent motive led officers to believe a pyromaniac was responsible.

An insane person was sought. Close watch was kept in the vicinity. A 17-year-old youth, not normal mentally, was questioned.

Investigation disclosed that he had a mania for the excitement of a fire, and was responsible.

A cleaning and pressing war in Chickasha brought about much fire-fighting. Jones was on the lookout for firebugs. The occurrence of the first blaze was the occasion of a prompt investigation.

Three were arrested. One confessed and implicated the others. All were bound over to the district court for trial. The fires stopped.

2 Curry Officials Absolved of Charge

Gold Beach, Sept. 13 (AP)—District Attorney Grant J. Williams and Sheriff J. H. Turner were absolved of charges of negligence in handling a riot last October, at a hearing conducted for the governor by Judge J. T. Brand Monday.

Judge Brand recommended, however, in the light of new evidence, that the grand jury again probe the riot.

TAMMANY BEGINS COURT FOR MAYOR

New York, Sept. 13 (AP)—Tammany Hall began its court fight today to force an election in November to fill the place of James J. Walker, who resigned as mayor while under fire.

John T. Dooling, chairman of the Tammany law committee, obtained an order from Justice Irwin Untermyer, requiring Mayor Joseph V. McKee and the board of elections to show cause tomorrow why a writ of mandamus should not be issued compelling them to certify the mayor's office as vacant.

McKee began court action yesterday designed to establish his right to fill out Walker's unexpired term.

STUDEBAKER MERGES WITH WHITE MOTORS

Cleveland, Sept. 13 (AP)—Merger of the White Motor Co. of Cleveland and the Studebaker Corporation of South Bend, Ind., was announced by White Motor officials here today.

Plans for the merger were completed following a meeting of directors of the Cleveland company in New York today.

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RESULT IN MAINE WAKES UP HOOVER

Washington, Sept. 13 (AP)—President Hoover late today made public a copy of a telegram to Everett Sanders, chairman of the republican national committee, saying that the democratic success in the Maine election "imposes need for renewed and stronger effort that the people may fully understand the issues at stake."

Because, it would open the way for greater violation of law, the enforcement of this law being left to the federal officers of whom there are but 16 in this state. It would make of our state a bootlegger's paradise. Similar action in Montana is said to have increased bootlegging 300 per cent.

Because, human welfare is paramount to all other issues, and it is universally conceded that human welfare increases as alcoholic liquor decreases.

Because, under prohibition the volume of business along all lines except those dependent on alcoholic liquors has shown a great increase. Money spent for liquor cannot be spent for other things. An increase in the liquor business, legal or illegal, would mean a decrease in other lines, particularly dairy products—milk, cream, butter, ice cream, etc., the per capita consumption of which increased 142.7 pounds in 12 years.

Because, the history of prohibition in Oregon shows that the better class of people have always favored it. Oregon was among the 16 states that adopted prohibition before the Civil War. War conditions and the activity of the brewers repealed these laws in all states except Maine. We adopted constitutional prohibition in 1914 by 36,826. In the 1921 legislation two repeal measures were overwhelmingly defeated.

Because, prohibition is increasingly effective. Col. Woodcock, federal director of the prohibition bureau, after a national survey, declares prohibition 75 per cent enforced, a better percentage than many other laws. Lieut. Lansing of the state police says that the prohibition law is as well enforced in Oregon as any other law and ten times better than the traffic laws.

It will be defeated, if all citizens having the welfare of their children, homes, communities, state and nation at heart register and on November 8 mark their ballots X 313. N. I. vote against repealing the law.

Chicago, Sept. 13 (AP)—President Hoover will personally lead his campaign for re-election into the mid-west and east with addresses in both sections, Chairman Everett Sanders of the republican national committee revealed today.

The president plans one address in the east and at least one and possibly two speeches in the mid-western area, the chairman announced.

Reports were that the president was considering speeches in New York and Chicago with a possible third address at either Minneapolis or Kansas City.

STUDEBAKER MERGES WITH WHITE MOTORS

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NEW SYSTEM OF ACCOUNTING FOR STUDENTS

An approved plan of accounting in order that a complete record may be kept on the materials used by junior high school students taking work in the vocational education department will be placed in effect during the coming term by T. T. Mackenzie, director. Letters advising parents of the plan will be mailed this week in the hope that a full understanding of the new system may be had before students enter school.

All students taking shop work in junior high schools are permitted to choose the devices or projects they contemplate working on during the year. And while no shop fee is charged, students will be asked to pay the costs of materials they will use. When the projects are completed they remain the property of the students who will be permitted to take them home. In order that the school district may sustain no loss due to failure of students to pay for the materials used, they will be asked to put up deposits before material is drawn. They will be permitted to draw against this sum as long as they have money to their credit. When that is used up a further deposit will be required. Any unused balance will be returned to the students at the end of each semester. Seventh grade students will be required to make a deposit of 50 cents, eighth grade, 75 cents and 9th grade, \$1.

Mackenzie states that his office is being flooded by requests from students who wish to take up machine shop and auto shop work this year. Many will be disappointed, since accommodations are available for a limited number only.
