Other business matters were discussed in getting the work of the club underway for the coming season.

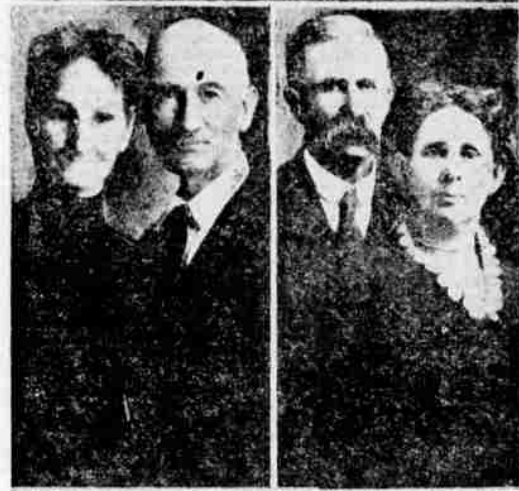
