

ASSAULT CASE BATTLERS GET FINES, COSTS

Silverton—A trial of unusual length, lasting from 10 o'clock Friday morning till 4 o'clock in the afternoon, which took place at the city hall in the council room, was of interest in being transferred from the blinding over to the grand jury back to the local justice court of which P. L. Brown is judge. This was accomplished by stipulation agreement of Alf O. TEACHER WINS COURT ACTION UPON CONTRACT

Kings Valley—A court decision of vital importance to all public school teachers in the state of Oregon was handed down by Judge Hamilton in the circuit court of Benton county at Coquille, September 28, when he sustained the motion of Attorney John Jeffrey of Portland that the plaintiff, Wilson Bump, be given judgment against Union high school district No. 3 of Benton county, Kings Valley, for salary and interest due on teachers contract.

The school board had attempted to break the contract with Bump without giving him a chance to defend himself, without due notice or justifiable cause, and without having any charges or reasons spread upon the records of the school district.

The defense attorneys founded their pleadings on the Foreman case. The attorneys for the plaintiff showed that the Foreman case did not parallel this case in any particular, that the dismissal had been without sufficient cause, and that the school board had not followed the law.

Judge Hamilton discussed each step of his decision in full detail that there might be no question in the minds of those hearing the case of any one who should need to cite his decision at any future time.
