

SILVERTON PTA NIGHT PROGRAM HELPS FATHERS

Silverton—Every other month the Silverton P. T. A. will hold a night meeting, to enable the fathers of school children to attend the sessions. It was decided Thursday afternoon at the first fall meeting of the group.

Miss Marie Klev was elected secretary to take the place of Miss Mary Carter, resigned.

Mrs. R. L. Wright, department of administration of the state congress of Parent-Teachers and Robert Goetz, city schools superintendent, were principal speakers on the Thursday program. Miss Mildred Wharton sang, "The Wind and Rain in Your Hair," and "Owed to You," accompanied by Miss Ruth Lawrence at the piano.

The three ferneries were awarded the rooms having the greatest number of parents present, Miss Marion Umphrette, of the grades, Miss Lawrence, of junior high, and H. W. Wells, senior high, winning.

Mr. Goetz spoke briefly on the infantile paralysis "scare" that is prevailing among parents and children. There is only one actual case of the disease right now, and that is in Central Howell, and that is in under quarantine. A number of children have been sent home from school because of colds or other illness, he said. This is for precautionary reasons, only, he said, as colds lead to susceptibility to any disease. He urged the mothers to watch their children closely for symptoms of colds and to put them to bed at once, upon detection.

In his outline of a proposed plan of study for the Parent-Teachers for the coming year, Mr. Goetz favored making study of educational activities of the state, how they are supported, and where the money comes from. He included a study of the development of public schools, later bringing in some outside authority to talk on how to reduce taxes without harming education and how to find other sources of income.

He urged the members, as individuals, to watch closely the efforts of the legislatures to curtail funds for welfare organizations of the state in which they live. P. T. A. is especially interested. Be ready to lend support or offer objections, he urged.

Mrs. Wright's talk too, was partly regarding pending legislative bills. She urged the group to sponsor a bill to come up before the state legislature requiring the inspection of home before children are assigned to them. She also urged favor of the county unit and school consolidation plan and the mothers' aid bill. She asked the mothers and fathers to fight, by all lowering the age of children permitted to work from 16 years to 12 years. She spoke also on the work of the Oregon congress of P. T. A.

Silverton—Mrs. Margaret Hislop-Town, who died at the family home on 241 Mill street early Thursday morning, was known as the grand old lady of the Ramona chapter, O. E. S. She was a charter member and an honorary member of

the chapter and had served several times as worthy matron and was also an active member of the Past Matrons' club of that order. Local members of the Eastern Star will have charge of the graveside services at the Miller cemetery. Funeral services will be held at the Jack and Ekman Funeral home Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Mrs. Town was born December 28, 1848, in Vaughn, Ontario, Canada. She was married to William Town at Woodstock, Ontario, February 13, 1864, and they have celebrated the wedding anniversary with members of their family and many friends as guests for more than 40 years. The Towns moved to Grading, N. D., in August, 1881, and lived there until 1892, when they moved to Silverton and have since resided.

The westward trip was made via the old Canadian Pacific railway. Accompanying them from North Dakota were Mr. and Mrs. John Nicks, both deceased. Mr. and Mrs. Town owned the Frank Wray farm, on which Lewis Melbye now lives, for a number of years, maintaining their home in the city where Town was one of the first rural mail carriers out of Silverton, which position he held long after time for retirement, being kept in the service by special exception. Town also owned a large livery stable here which is well-remembered by the older residents.

Death came to Mrs. Town after an illness of early spring, which became critical about three months ago. She failed rapidly during the last four days, not being able to leave her chair on account of difficulty in breathing. All her children, except William Town, Jr., of Willowbrook, Calif., were at her death bed. Mr. and Mrs. Nixon Palmer of Prosser, Wash., came Tuesday and Mr. and Mrs. Harry Town of Tacoma, have been here a number of days.

Besides her husband, Mrs. Town is survived by three sons, Harry, of Tacoma, Wash., George William, Jr., of Willowbrook, Calif., and Beverly L. of Silverton, and two daughters, Marie Town-Mooley of Silverton, and Gertrude Palmer of Prosser, Wash. Grandchildren of Mrs. Town are Arthur G. Town of Tacoma, Harry Palmer of Scotia, N. Y., Marie Scott of Portland, Frances Sargher of Dulur, Pauline Cooley, Olive McKee and Sidney McKee of Silverton.
