

LEAKY HEATER CAUSES DEATH OF CLUB WOMAN

Silverton—Rev. J. A. Bennett and Mrs. Bennett received a telephone call from their son, James E. Bennett, who lives in Webster Groves, residence district of St. Louis, Mo., announcing the tragic death of their friend, Mrs. William S. Hull, whose home was also in Webster Groves.

Mrs. Hull was past 82 years of age and had just returned from a trip to California where she had stopped for a few weeks, after attending the national convention of Women's clubs in Seattle in June, Mrs. Hull was a house guest of the Bennetts, also, in June, and was an honor guest of the Silverton Women's club in a post-convention session held at the home of Mrs. G. B. Benson. She had traveled extensively and was active in many phases of Women's club work. The Seattle convention was the fourth national session she had attended. She was sent as a delegate from the St. Louis Sunday club, one of the most prominent club organizations in the nation. She had been secretary of the Monday club for a number of years. She was well known here, having made three extensive visits to Silverton in the past seven years.

Mrs. Hull maintained her own home near that of her daughter, Mrs. P. B. Miller, and in planning a surprise to meet daughter, Bennett, a definite date for her return. A slow leak in the gas in her home caused a poisoning which resulted in her death in a few days. She was found during the day after her arrival in a semi-conscious condition from which she did not rally. She was a sound sleeper, and is supposed to have been overcome, unconscious of the situation, while in her own room in which was a gas heater, when her relatives went to her room the next morning and found her. She died Thursday.

NORMAL EXPECTING LATE ENROLLMENTS

Monmouth—Enrollment at the Oregon Normal school has now reached a total of 467 students, with distribution as follows: Juniors 197; seniors 254 and six graduates who are taking post graduate work.

The enrollment to date is about 14 per cent below that of last year, but late arrivals are expected to boost the total for the term. Of the 467 enrolled to date 331 are women and 136 men. Thirty counties of the state are represented in the student body.

Following are the 10 counties sending greatest number: Polk 93, Multnomah 87, Marion 38, Clackamas 38, Lane 30, Linn 29, Washington 26, Yamhill 20, Columbia 17 and Benton 15. Ten students are enrolled from out of state.

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Bridge Destroyed By Brush Blaze; Mail Is Rerouted
