State AAUW In Salem Oct. 21-22

The ninth annual conference of the Oregon state division, American Association of University Women, will be held in the Salem Masonic temple next Friday and Saturday, October 21 and 22. Members of the Salem branch will be hostesses to the two day conference with the general executive board, headed by the president, Mrs. J. A. Jelderks, in charge of all arrangements. Miss Mabel Robertson will act as the official convention hostess.

The conference will open next Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock with a branch presidents section meeting with Dean Kate W. Jameson, Corvallis, state vice-president, presiding. A dinner will be held at 6:30 o'clock in the Masonic temple. Mrs. G. A. Johnson, Portland, state president, will preside at the dinner. Dr. Edward O. Sisson, of Reed college, the dinner speaker, will talk on the topic, "The Crisis in Ownership."

Registration of delegates will be held Saturday morning at 9 o'clock. Between 40 and 50 delegates from other branches in the state are expected.
