

NOTED ACTRESS AGAIN WINNER OF HIGH HONOR

Hollywood, Calif., Oct. 13 (P)—The veteran actress, Marie Dressler, who last year won the award of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences for the best performance by an actress, has been nominated for the honor again this year. The award will be made November 13 and Miss Dressler was among the three nominated, Lynn Fontanne and Helen Hayes being the other two.

Miss Dressler was named for her portrayal of the motherly nurse in "Kismet." Last year it was her performance in "Min and Bill," in which she enacted the role of a waterfront character, that gave her the award. Miss Fontanne was nominated for role in "The Guardsman," and Miss Hayes for her part in "The Sign of the Cross."

These three actresses were the best performers in an actor were Wallace Beery in "The Champ," Alfred Lunt in "The Guardsman," and Frederic March in "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde."

Frank Borzage, King Vidor and Joseph Van Stanberg were the directors nominated for the academy award. Borzage was named for his production of "Bad Girl," Vidor for "The Champ" and Van Stanberg for "The Shanghai Express."

The three pictures nominated for the best photography were "Arrow Smith," "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" and "The Shanghai Express."

The best original motion picture story will be chosen from Frances Marion's "The Champ," Grover Jones' "Lady and Gent," Lucien Hubbard's "Star Witness" and "What Price Hollywood" by Gene Fowler, Rowland Brown and Adela Rogers St. John.

Rerouting Topic Of Road District

WYOMING TRIES ANOTHER APPLE

Lander, Wyo., (P)—Three new types of apple, particularly adapted to Wyoming's climate, have been developed by the Department of Experiment Farms station here.

Experimentation, conducted for a period of 10 years, has resulted in three trees bearing a new type of apple. The varieties are now being propagated.

The largest of the new varieties bears the name of John Roberts, after the pioneer Indian trader, and is green on one side and streaked with red on the other. The skin is thin, fine grained and slightly acid in flavor. It is well suited for both cooking and eating.

The next largest apple of the three has been named the Chief Washakie. It is spherical in shape, slightly yellow at the stem end, and streaked closely with red on all sides. The skin is of medium depth and width, the skin thin, and the flesh is white, fine grained and tender. It has a slightly tart flavor.

The smallest of the three is practically the same shape. The stem is long and slender, the basin tender, and the flesh is white, very deep and narrow, skin thin, and fine grained and sweet. It is an especially good eating apple.
