

WILLAMETTE LEAVES FOR FIRST CONFERENCE TILT

BEARCAT SQUAD PLAYS COYOTES FRIDAY NIGHT

Whether Willamette university will be up among the best in the Northwest conference football race this fall or will be classified as an "also ran" will be determined to a large extent Friday night at Caldwell, Idaho when Coach "Spec" Keene sends his Bearcats against Coach Anse Cornell's College of Idaho Coyotes. Coach Keene is making no secret of the fact that he will consider himself lucky to make it four in a row over Idaho, while he will not be at all surprised if he comes home Saturday with the short end of the score.

Coach Keene had originally planned to take 20 men on the trip to Idaho. However, since several of his men are still suffering from leg injuries and may not be able to play but a few minutes, he thought it advisable to take a squad of 22. Erickson, Frank, Jones, Pelton, Grannis and one of two others have been nursing ailments of one sort or another but in recent days have recovered sufficiently to permit of their being used in practice.

The team has been driven hard during the week with night sessions taking place Tuesday and Wednesday. The squad rested Thursday and will board the 6-15 northbound Southern Pacific train.

Members of the squad making the trip include: Ends—Kaiser, Gribble, Carson and Emmel. Tackles—Weiser, Kockisch, McKerrow and Connors. Guards—Boyd, Pelton, Tweed and Woodworth. Centers—Houck and Grannis. Backfield—Frantz, Jones, Paul, Cannady, Adams, Olson, Oravec and Erickson.

The Caldwell game will be the first of the conference series for Willamette.

FILIPINO PUGILIST WINS STATE TITLE

Oakland, Cal., Oct. 13 (AP)—"Speedy" Dado, flashy Filipino pugilist, were the state bantamweight crown again here today as a result of a ten-round victory over his fellow countryman, "Young" Tommy, in a battle which brought cheer after cheer from the fans last night.

The two fighters, who each weighed 117½ pounds, mixed willingly and set a rapid pace throughout. Dado had an edge in all but the first round, which was fairly even, and the sixth which went to Tommy by a slight margin. In the second round Dado scored a knockdown but his opponent was up without a count. Dado's superior boxing and hitting ability were the deciding factors.

Israel Beaten By Bundy of Seattle

Seattle, Oct. 13 (AP)—Andy Bundy, colored featherweight from Portland, showed too much class and hitting power for Able Israel of Seattle and won a six-round main event last night on one of the best boxing cards seen in Crystal Pool.

Bundy knocked Israel down with a hard left to the face in the first round and from then on had the best of the milling, footed, hooked and crooked to win by a good margin. Israel put up a strong aggressive battle, and opened a cut over Bundy's eye in the third.

WEBFEET, BEARS HOPE FOR FAST FIELD SATURDAY

Eugene, Ore., Oct. 13 (AP)—Although hoping for a fast field when his Oregon University football squad meets the Bruins from the University of California at Los Angeles in a Pacific Coast conference game Saturday afternoon at Portland, Coach Prink Callison was planning today to concentrate attention on an attack that will be effective on a wet field.

Long awaited rain has made its presence felt in western Oregon, and if the Portland civic stadium field has a portentous moisture content Saturday, the Oregon squad will probably resort to a line plunging game, Callison intimated.

In such event, a large share of the offensive will fall upon the shoulders of Howard Bobbitt, fullback, and Stan Koska, halfback. Bobbitt will fill the post left temporarily vacant by Mike Mikulak, whose injured knee is expected to keep him on the bench.

The game will be played for the benefit of the Shrine hospital at Portland. Los Angeles, Oct. 13 (AP)—University of California at Los Angeles football team was enroute to Portland today with the fond hope that fair weather would greet them in their game with Oregon Saturday. "We should beat them on a dry field," Coach Bill Spaulding told the student body in a farewell address. "If it is a wet field there is no telling what will happen. Maybe the team that fumbles the fewest times will win."

Spaulding let it be known that he was prepared for rain, having worked his team with a wet ball during the last week so that it could become accustomed to handling a soggy pigskin.

The rest will be welcome to a number of the players who were injured in the game last Friday with Tillamook high.

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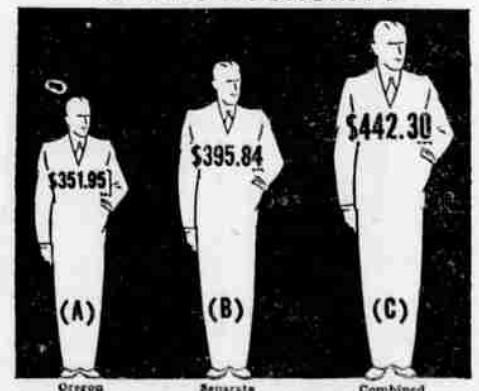

IF OREGON is forced, to combine the University of Oregon with the Oregon State College, there would be an increase in instructional costs of \$90.00 each year per student, or over \$450,000 ADDITIONAL INSTRUCTION costs for a combined student body.

New York, Oct. 13 (AP)—Coming almost together, the closing of New York's outdoor fistic season and the opening of the major indoor campaign serve to affirm Tony Canzoneri's place at the head of the lightweight division and to fill in a blank spot which marks the featherweight division in the New York state athletic commission's list of champions.

Tonight's 15 round scrap between Kid Chocolate, the clever Cuban negro, and Lew Feldman, of New York carries the board's recognition as a featherweight championship affair.
