

OLD TIME RALLY ATTRACTS MANY FOR SILVERTON

Silverton—A near old-fashioned campaign political rally with all the trimmings except the street parade with torches, featured the gathering of hundreds of republicans at the Eugene Field building. Thursday evening, at which three major issues and general situations were stressed in the talks—tariff, reconstruction finance corporation and farm relief. The brass band was well represented in the 50-piece school band directed by Hal Campbell in a half hour concert preceding the speeches. The Clough-Barrett quartet sang several numbers, with vocal solo by Elvin Almqvist and Theodor Thordson to guitar accompaniment by Almqvist.

Dr. A. F. Blackerby, precinct chairman welcomed the visitors with Charles Johnson introducing Chris Kovitz, county chairman of the central committee, who presided as chairman.

Ralph W. Emmons, league officer of the Young Republicans club of Marion county was the introductory speaker. He extended an invitation to young republicans to attend the session Friday at the Marion hotel. William H. Trindle, candidate for district attorney spoke briefly, and James W. Mott, candidate for congress, committed himself definitely as to his vote on measures now pending.

U. S. Senator Frederick Steiwer, candidate for re-election, was the principal speaker of the rally. He classified the tariff as a social and human problem as it concerned particularly for the Oregonian, the standard of living, of education, the family structure, and the very life of the American people. The lumber tariff, in which local residents are vitally interested, was stressed. Steiwer maintained that figures proved through depression was reached as concerned banking conditions, during October and November of 1931. He praised the aid from the reconstruction finance corporation as a help to not be overlooked.

Meet was late in arriving from an evening at Sublimity, and Kovitz kept most of the large group interested until he arrived. Steiwer left early in the program for other engagements.
