

RYAN REMAINS SCHOOL HEAD FOR CHEMAWA

Chemawa—James T. Ryan who has been acting superintendent of the Indian school since April, 1931, has received word from the bureau of Indian affairs at Washington, that effective November 1 he will assume the title of superintendent. This advancement is in recognition of his efficiency. Ryan came to Chemawa as principal during the fall of 1930 and took charge of all school activities the following April when Superintendent Lippe was transferred to Sacramento.

During Ryan's administration many changes and improvements have been made in the school's curriculum, especially in vocational training. Character building is one of his hobbies and during the past year and a half has been working out various original plans further the sense of responsibility among the students.

Ryan has had wide experience as an educator. He holds a Bachelor's and Master's degree from the University of Wisconsin and finished a course of specialized work at Columbia university. At one time he was on the staff at Temple normal school and has had educational experience in the states of Arizona, Delaware and Kentucky.

MT. ANGEL COUNCIL CALLS TAX MEETING
