

BETTER WALKS ADVOCATED BY COUNCIL BILL

Silverton—Probably the most important work of the Silverton city council at the regular meeting Monday night was the passing of a resolution concerning the rebuilding or repairing of sidewalks.

Another discussion was the need of a new ordinance to cover the question of insurance rates for those living in the close in, out-lying districts of town, near enough to come under the protection of the city fire department, but as the city charter now is the department is only morally obligated to respond to fire calls. The present low insurance rates for these residents will not be available, according to the reports of the adjustment commission, unless the city fire department may by obligation, service these districts. Mayor Eastman referred the matter to the judiciary committee for consideration, and a report to be made at the special meeting to be called next Monday evening.

Other questions determined were concerning the payment for the use of "free" water to those who were receiving county aid, the city agreeing to meet these payments from emergency or welfare funds and reimburse the water commission so these will be no funds furnished free by the commission. This action was the result of the council adopting the report of the judiciary committee concerning the dispensing of free water, and their recommendation that a committee of two from the council and a special investigator be appointed by the mayor to determine who was worthy of this favor, so the action may not be imposed upon. Those to serve are E. W. Garver and W. L. McGinnis from the council members, and Robert Goetz as special investigator.

H. B. Latham brought to the attention of the council members, the condition of certain families who were in immediate need of aid. This was discussed at length as to who was worthy of help, and just how to keep the generosity of the welfare dispensers from being imposed upon by those who were able to help themselves. The question was referred to a committee for a report within a few days.

Garver reported on the experience of Astoria as learned from his attending the city of Oregon Cities League. As head of the committee in charge of the work of painting and repairing the city hall, Garver also reported the progress of the repairs. A communication was read from the light house division of the department of commerce in regard to the federal lease of the local airport land. A new form of lease is desired by the department. This was placed in the hands of the judiciary committee for action.

As the time has passed in which an appeal to a higher court might be made in regards to the fate of the murderers of Iverson, the record was ordered to be placed in the hands of the city attorney, who was instrumental in the conviction of those guilty, and was adjudged the legal right by the council to the reward of \$200.

The Portland Electric company agreed to remove the steps from the light poles that have been a temptation to the youth of town to climb the poles and tamper with the city's lights. The steps are of no further use as other methods of placing and removing the lights have been adopted by the street commissioner. All bacteria count of the milk supply source to the city was reported low.

Farsey Rose as president of the Ad club, recently formed among the business men of town, asked that the engineer's room in the city hall be given over to the use of the club instead of being a place for book binding in connection with the city library. This met with adverse discussion and was referred to the members of the new building committee for report at the special meeting of next week. Rose explained that Earl Adams as president of the chamber of commerce was to have been with him in a request for the chamber use of the engineer's room, but Adams didn't appear.

At a previous meeting of the council, the question of allowing repairs to certain wood sidewalks in the assigned cement districts to be made, was a matter of lengthy consideration. The street committee was instructed to ask advice of the city attorney, Kuster Ross, in regard to allowing repairs to be made in case the owners could not go to the expense of making cement walks and wished to correct the dangerous condition of the wood walks. This resulted in the resolution being voted on and signed by the mayor as a temporary solution, and considered passed as an emergency measure, to relieve the present problem of safe sidewalks by repair rather than placing cement walks. The council reserved the right to repeat the resolution at any time they see fit. The resolution provides that where one fourth of the material in the walk may be used for rebuilding walks, that repairs in like materials be allowed the property owners in rebuilding their walks. The fire district of town is exempt from the provisions of the resolution. The street commission is given full power to decide the condition of walks in the need of repairs.

HEIRLOOMS ARE SEEN AT FAIR, GRANGE EVENT

A hand embroidered dress, brought from Scotland about 75 years old was exhibited by Mrs. Mabel Patton. The dress, which was given to Mrs. Patton by Mrs. H. Scott, was made over in order that Vernon Patton, son of Mrs. Patton might wear it when he was a baby. Mrs. Patton also exhibited a genuine Merchaum pipe brought across the plains in 1849 by her grandfather, Preston Parsons.

Two other old baby dresses were exhibited; one by Mrs. W. H. Humphreys and one by Mrs. Lillie Harris. The dress exhibited by Mrs. Humphreys was made for Mrs. Humphreys' brother, George Ashby, who was born in 1849. The dress exhibited by Mrs. Harris was worn by Mrs. Magee, Levi Harris, Violet Harris, Verberia Harris, Hazel Harris, Frank Harris and Mrs. Magee's two children, Margaret and Hazel. Mrs. Magee also exhibited chambray skin shoes, worn by both of her children, which were made from the chambray skin underwear worn by W. J. Culver in Alaska during the gold rush.

Miss Valera Amant had on exhibit a depression plant, and Miss Viola Looker exhibited her art work.
