BUDGET GAINS SCHOOL LEVY

Albany—Although Albany school administration costs for the present year have been reduced under those of last year to the extent of \$16,171.21, or more than 13 per cent, the 1933 levy exceeds last year's by about \$3,500 as the result of decreased income from sources outside the district tax and added requirements for bond retirement, according to the budget adopted by the district budget board. The budget for the present year carries a total of \$136,162.82, of which \$53,220 will be received from sources other than the district.

Last year the total budget was \$142,884.03, of which \$63,575.65 was raised from sources other than district taxes and \$79,308.38 was levied as the district tax. Income from sources other than district taxes has declined by \$10,355.63 this year.
