

COUNCIL FACES SPECIAL MEET; RULINGS HEARD

Silverton—Outstanding features of the regular session of the city council Monday night were the rejection of one ordinance and acceptance of another. A special meeting will be held which will be the last one of the year and which will mark the change of mayors by E. W. Garver, who replaces L. C. Egan.

Ordinance No. 255, concerning possession, transportation, manufacture, etc., of liquor as regards city action, was read the third time with the report of the judiciary committee unfavorable. This will be taken up again at the special session.

Ordinance No. 256 met favor in that it relates to residents within a mile outside the city limits having authorized protection from the city fire department in order that insurance rates may not take a definite rise. The ordinance is awaiting third reading with a positive prospect for adoption.

Other affairs of the city disposed of included a reference to the judiciary committee of taxes and street improvements of certain properties involved; acceptance of the committee on finance report; refund of half the license fee to the Knights of Pythias lodge for dances conducted by members; granting Ward Terry and others interest in the organization of a rifle club the use of the rock quarry site; tabling a request from Otto Patterson for free use of city property for growing vegetables; and granting the water commission privilege of placing a standard hydrant at the corner of East Oak and Church streets, replacing a stand pipe.

School children may purchase seals but are not being asked to act as salespeople as formerly. Seals have been distributed to the rural school districts and Miss Ina Harold of the local post office will have seals for further distribution. The committee in charge desires it to be generally known that 95 per cent of the receipts from sales remains in the state and but five per cent goes to the national organization.

DALLAS CHURCH DEDICATION IS GREAT AFFAIR
