

ANNUAL BUDGET AWAITS ACTION FOR WOODBURN

Woodburn.—Little business of importance was transacted at the regular meeting of the city council Tuesday night. The matter of the condition of the Bogard building on Front street, which was badly damaged by fire last July, was brought up on the complaint of Mrs. Mayne Cochran, owner of an adjacent property, who stated that bricks from the Bogard structure were falling on her property and causing damage. This matter has been brought up several times by the council in an effort to have some action taken to remedy the situation with no result.

Maurice Bogard, one of the owners of the property, was present and stated that it was the insurance company that was holding up the proceedings, the parties concerned not being able to agree on a settlement. After some discussion a motion was made and carried that the owners and the insurance company be notified that unless some definite agreement could be reached and action taken to remove or repair the damaged building by the next council meeting that the council would start condemnation proceedings and take action to safeguard the citizens.

It was ordered upon motion that a bill of \$5 be presented to the company for use of the city hall on election day.

An application was read from Dr. Paul Pemberton for the construction of an office building at the corner of First and Hayes streets and to connect with the sewer at that location and on motion the petition was granted.

City Attorney McCord and Treasurer Paul Mills were requested to report on the city property advertised for sale by the county as to its value and the advisability of the city bidding the property in to secure title. This report is to be made by February first.
