

OWNERSHIP OF STOLEN COUPE BRINGS GRIEF

Woodburn—J. W. Richards had the unique experience last week of being held up three times by police officers and accused of stealing his wife's car.

The coupe was stolen from its parking place in front of the Richards home Monday evening by an escaped inmate of the state training school and was recovered Tuesday morning at Roseburg by state police. Richards went to Roseburg Tuesday night to bring the car home. On the way home he was stopped at Junction City by a state traffic officer but after considerable explaining was allowed to proceed.

Thursday evening he made a business trip to Vernonia and returned by way of Portland and Oregon City late at night. In Portland he was stopped by police and again had considerable explaining to do before he was allowed to proceed. At Oregon City he was stopped for the third time and this time was taken to the jail and held for 45 minutes while he tried to convince the officer that the car belonged to his wife and he was not stealing it. Finally after showing all the credentials he could muster it was necessary to call Farley Mogan of Salem, state traffic officer, who ordered his release.

The recovery of the stolen car had not been reported by the Roseburg officers, hence the trouble, which is an indication the police are on their job and keeping their eyes open.

HIMES EXPLAINS WAREHOUSE ARREST

Dallas—In order to correct any mistaken impressions which might arise in connection with the arrest Friday afternoon of Minor Lewis by Buck Merriott, federal prohibition officer, on a charge of possession of Bill Himes, in whose office the arrest took place, wishes the facts of the case to be correctly stated.

The story, told by Bill is as follows: He, in company with Bill Middleton, was discussing the question of certain supplies for next season. In Bill's warehouse office when a car stopped outside and Lewis stepped out of it. He first of all tried to get in by the small door but finding it locked he entered the warehouse paying no attention to Bill's shout to hold on and he would unlock the door. No sooner had he disappeared into the warehouse than another car drove up and parked, and the federal agent alighted and at once entered the warehouse.

Bill stepped out to see what was going on and narrowly escaped being upset in the mad scramble for the rear entrance of the office which was being staged by the pair. The affair was all "greek" to Himes and Middleton who were unaware of the identity of the second man, Merriott, however, soon enlightened them when he urged Lewis to quit carrying on as he was under arrest. In the struggle a bottle of liquor slipped from Lewis' pocket and was partly spilled on the floor. The arrested man is reported to have said that he was neither making or selling the stuff but was simply taking the bottle to a friend in town who was sick and had asked him for some whiskey.

Silverton—Notwithstanding the fact that during the past year Silverton has suffered a number of business reverses, wages are lower, work was not plentiful and like in other communities, the property owners found taxpaying time a worry, yet one source of encouragement in the Silver Falls state park and the permanent benefits promised local residents in the fuller establishing of the more than a thousand acres of scenic wonder as a well-known resort, within ten miles of Silverton.

More than 20,000 persons are known to have visited this region during the vacation months of 1932. The Salem chamber of commerce were influential in adding a large acreage, and thousands have noted with interest the last year's improvement of the Silverton-Silver Falls-Salem loop secondary state highway. But one bridge yet remains to be finished for completion of the road circle and that is over the south fork of Silver creek. This is under construction with Oscar Stornal as contractor. The scenic rustic bridge over the north fork near the North Falls, just completed is admired by all visitors.

Stretches of highway widened, graded and firmly gravelled, are two and one-half miles on the north side, one and one-half miles on the south, and two and one-half miles in the south-Mathew sector. An interesting improvement in the park, not known generally, is the construction of several miles of new trails. A wide gravelled trail runs under and back of the high South Falls, and another was built back of the Lower South Falls.

A whole mountain side gave way to the graders and gravelers in providing an extensive parking space near the North Falls, where the view is especially good.

J. D. Drake has probably done more than any other individual in the establishing of the park as state property. He harvests the mountain lily seeds by the gallon from his ranch and scatters them over the hundreds of acres of timbered vastnesses many weeks of the year. There is no need to pay for parking space or gate entrances to the park. The state has provided both free to all travelers.

Some agitation toward making the state park a winter play-ground met approval especially when the falls were frozen into tons of solid ice, forming grandors indescribable. Skiing possibilities are also favorable in prospect.
