

WEST WOODBURN POULTRY RANCH NOW EXPANDING

Woodburn—Extensive plans for expansion of the Westwood farm hatchery at West Woodburn, and the formation of the partnership of A. E. Leary and son to operate the establishment have been announced by Leary.

The Westwood Farm hatchery has been in operation 11 years and has grown in that time from one incubator of 120 eggs capacity to its present capacity of 15,000 eggs in a modern Jamesway incubator. Mr. and Mrs. Leary came to Woodburn from Kansas 11 years ago. Their son, Ora Leary, recently returned from Peru where he was in charge of the chemical laboratory in a copper plant there for three years, and has entered into partnership with his father.

Plans have been completed to establish a trap nested poultry farm in connection with the hatchery. Arrangements have been made to raise from 600 to 1000 pullets next fall of the best stock obtainable. The first year they will be trap nested and divided according to the way they produce. The eggs thus obtained will be used for the hatchery which will give the egg records and other desirable points of the birds from which they come. Eventually 3000 birds will be kept on the place including Rhode Island Reds, Banded Plymouth Rocks, Anconas, Brown Leghorns and White Leghorns.

After the breeding stock is producing satisfactorily the capacity of the hatchery will be increased. Last year 30,000 baby chicks were sold in various parts of the Pacific coast region.

The hatching season for this year is already under way and 3200 eggs are in process of incubation at the present time. The season will last until June.

Leary is secretary-treasurer of the Oregon branch of the International Baby Chick association and is a member of the Oregon Poultry association.

The storm sewers were choked and many of the downtown crossings were inundated for deep wading.

Floating river continued to rise rapidly until mid-afternoon when the highest mark over the highway pavement near the Harding home was reported to have reached the depth of six feet with prospects of several inches rise before midnight. This is the highest mark in years.

Facts And Findings of Technocracy Revealed By Research Work

(Copyright, 1933, by United Press)
New York, Jan. 3 (U.P.)—In the four months since a newspaper discovered, through a press agent, a small room at Columbia university full of charts and statistics, labelled

"Technocracy," the nation's imagination has been stirred by a multitude of articles seeking to explain the movement.

On the one side, the technocrats appeared to present a gloomy picture of the future of humanity if the economic system under which the world has operated since the dawn of history is continued. On the other they appeared to hold out not only a cure for economic distress, but the hope for a utopia, if—

Technocracy, a word coined in 1919 by William H. Smyth of Berkeley, Cal., was scarcely known except to a few technologists, until Howard Scott described by some as "a genius at technological figures," and by others as "an economic Rudy Valve," employed it to popularize the research system he established in that small room at Columbia.

In its early manifestations, technocracy appeared to offer a new system to replace the world's worn-out economic machinery—a system in which nobody would work more than two hours a day and everybody would be happy and comfortable.

Later, under the proddings of skeptical economists, the high
