

COUNCIL FIXES MEETING NIGHT SCHEDULE YEAR

MT. ANGEL—The regular meeting of the city council was held at the city hall Monday evening at 8 o'clock, but the meeting was called adjourned until Tuesday evening on account of it being a holiday. The regular adjourned meeting of the council was held in the city hall at 7:30 o'clock, with all the members present except Councilman Fred A. Prosser and Otto L. Wellman. Councilman Hanning reported that the light on Church street at the railroad not be moved to alley in the rear of the Ruescher store. The applications of I. A. Bisenius and A. J. Weiss for the position of night watchman were read and ordered filed. Dr. E. W. Barnum was present and asked the council to do something about taking care of the extra amount of water which occurs frequently near his residence. The street committee was authorized to take care of this street situation. The meeting of the evening then adjourned and reconvened at 9 o'clock. The mayor announced that this was the organizing meeting and asked that the newly elected councilmen be sworn in. The recorder thereupon swore in Councilmen R. L. Young and Fred Schwab, Sr. The meeting nights of the council for the coming year were fixed for the first Monday of each month at the hour of 7:30 o'clock from October 1 to April 1, and at 8 o'clock from April 1 to September 30. Councilman Hanning of the street committee was authorized to build or repair the wood crosswalks on John street. It was voted to permit property owners to install lights in the alleys and have the monthly service charged on the city street light bill, providing the cost of the installation is paid by the property owners and the cost of maintaining the lights is paid to the city for a year in advance. RIVER HANDICAPPING COUNTY ACTIVITIES

Independence—The Willamette river at this point began to rise again Tuesday, caused by the heavy rains of New Year's day and night. There was an 18-foot stage of water here Wednesday and water rising about one inch an hour.

The lowlands in the Hopville district south of town and the ranches north of town on the river, are all under water, roads being closed to traffic in that vicinity. All stock and implements have been moved to the higher ground and buildings have been anchored down, with the expectation of higher water to follow. Considerable drift has been running in the river here, causing the ferry to be tied up.

Several wood-choppers have been shaking saws from the drifts and tying it up along the bank, awaiting the low water, to manufacture it into cord wood.

The rural mail carriers have been handicapped in their deliveries, being shut off both north and south on parts of their routes. High gum boots have been pressed into service.
